GOOD ENOUGH FOR US.—The following extract from a letter received in Charlottetown this week from a Prince Edward Islander now in Saskatchewan may be of interest to people who think they can better their condition by leaving Prince Edward Island:—"In the 23 crops I have seen taken off here this is the very worst weather in that time. There were only four or five days that the wheat was at prime condition. As a result of the weather the grade of the wheat is so affected that such as 20 cents a bushel is taken for the standard price. My neighbor has a large portion of his wheat out in stook covered with snow and it will probably not be threshed this fall." The period of harvesting has now extended over three months. P. E. Island is good enough for us.

QUEEN SQUARE SCHOOL WINS INTER-SCHOLASTIC CH'SHIP

Defeating West Kent Yesterday by Score of 5 to 3—Converted Try in Last Minutes of Game Turn Defeat Into Victory.

In the dying minutes of a hard fought and scintillating football fixture, West Kent with victory practically within their reach lost the verdict and the interscholastic championship to Queen Square yesterday afternoon at the Abegweit Grounds by a score of 5 to 3.

The splendid kick of "Ebble" Larter in converting Duffy's try was a fitting climax to a game of football the like of which has never before been exhibited by school boys in this city.

Larter's convert came at the opportune time for his team. His well directed and mighty boot from a difficult angle on the twenty yard line was a performance equal to anything of the kind seen on a local gridiron this year. However the sudden changing of the tide against the West Kenters did not seem to effect the morale of the team; instead on the other hand it made them play all the harder and only for a strong and determined defence thrown up by the Queen Square boys a winning try would surely have resulted. But quick to realize their advantage the latter played heady football to stave off every threatening attack of their opponents.

It was a hard game for West Kent to lose, considering the edge in territory they had in the first half and the fact of their going in to the last session on the long end of the scoring. On the other hand the win was well merited by Queen Square; facing onslaught after onslaught and purely on the defensive for the first twenty-five minutes they came back to the last unbuttoned face to the foe and unbuttoned to surmount a three to one lead and finish on the heavy side of the count.

Considering the number of practices, both teams played excellent football yesterday, especially the half lines, whose passing and ball carrying brought rounds of praise from a number of senior players who were present, and it is a safe bet that within the course of a few days the present younger generation of footballists.

Special mention may be made on the sterling performances of Lyola Grateful to Mr. James McMillan, referee, who throughout the four games played, not only gave his all as chief arbiter but added greatly to their splendid work by offering sound advice and excellent coaching when needed.

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
