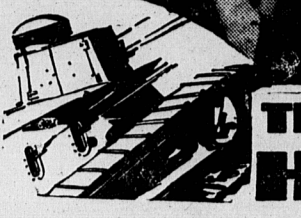

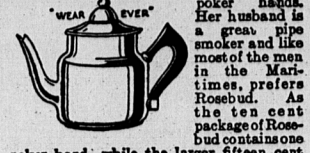

DEPARTS FOR OXFORD UNIV.—On Sunday evening last, August 10th, Rev. Jos. E. Campbell, one of the professional staff of St. Paul's College, left for England, where he will enter Oxford University. At the famous seat of learning, Father Campbell intends to make further studies in English, economics and physics. Rev. Joseph Campbell was born in Mitchell River, Prince Edward Island, in 1898. He made his elementary school studies in the public schools of the district, and went to St. Dunstan's University for his classical course. His theological studies were made at St. Joseph's Seminary, Edmonton, and Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax. Father Campbell holds the degree of B.A. from Laval University. Since ordination Father Campbell has been on the staff of St. Paul's College, where he has won the respect and confidence of the boys under his care. It is expected that upon completion of the two years at Oxford, Father Campbell will again be attached to St. Paul's.—North West Review, Winnipeg.

Patrol Ship Stalled In Northland

NORTH SYDNEY Aug 20—Word has been received at the department at Ottawa that the S. S. Beothic the Arctic patrol ship which left North Sydney the last of July is stalled about fifty miles from Boche Peninsula, the farthest northern post to receive the yearly provisioning.

After a stormy crossing of Davis Strait the Beothic arrived at Godhavn, the capital of northern Greenland, early on the morning of August 7 and in honor of the event the day was observed as a public holiday, the parliament of North Greenland adjourning for the duration of the visit.

The governor and Mrs. Rosendahl and the Danish officials and their wives were guests of the expedition on the ship which sailed the same evening for the Peninsula and reached Cape Alexander on August 10. The weather was murky and the ship proceeded very carefully and in order to avoid the ice packs of Baffin Bay she kept closely to the coast line. Cape Alexander is 50 miles southeast of Boche Peninsula, Ellesmere Island, and the heavy ice blocking Smith Sound has made further progress impossible until a change of conditions is noted, according to wireless despatch reported from Ottawa.

Bright English Comedy At The Prince Edward

Ruth Chatterton, like some other stars, likes to spring a surprise on an audience once in a while. She does just that in "The Lady of Scandal," Metro-Goldwyn Mayor's filmization of Frederick Lonsdale's celebrated stage play, "The High Road" now being shown at the Prince Edward Theatre. First one wonders at the experience with which she here in "Madame X" and other emotional dramas handles biting satire and subtle comedy and then one's mind is made up. Here is all comedy, she is so good in an intensely dramatic part.

She is surrounded by a brilliant cast in the filmization of the play. Mrs. Paul Rathbone, who starred in "The Last of Mrs. Cheyney" at the same theatre plays the hero as the snobbish peer who couldn't fall in love, while Ralph Forbes of "Beau Geste" fame is seen as the lover who finds he isn't in the end.

Nance O'Neill, American stage star, and Fred Kerr, eminent British actor for whom the original play was written, are teamed as Lord Trench and his sarcastic wife, and extract many laughs from their roles, while Cyril Chadwick, Moon Carroll, Robert Bolder, MacKenzie Ward, Effie Elster and Edgar Norton all handle subtle character roles with great skill.

While there are many laughs, and much brilliant repartee in the dialogue, the underlying theme is dramatic, being a woman's sacrifice of her lover to another woman who needs him more. Sidney Franklin's direction is deft and intelligent, and the settings lavish, especially the great underground theatre set, in which Miss Chatterton, as the actress, dances and sings a song number by Jack King and Elsie Janis.

LARGELY ATTENDED FUNERAL—The funeral of Miss Myrtle Williams, who passed away suddenly while visiting was held in St. John's Church, at Fort Hill, on Monday afternoon and was attended by her friends from all parts of the Province. Rev. Mr. Coleman officiated assisted by Rev. Mr. Cook. Interment was in the Anglican Cemetery at Fort Hill. There were many beautiful floral tributes. The pallbearers, five of whom were her brothers-in-law, were Messrs S. Miller, L. Walsh, McGovern, Robert England, Clifford Hays and Willard Phillips. Mrs R. C. Hays whose name was inadvertently left out of the list of mourners, had left on Saturday for her home in Somerville, Mass., but on receiving word of her sister's death immediately returned accompanied by her son, Mr. Elmer Hays and his wife. They remained over for the funeral. Mrs. Hays, another sister, who had also left this morning for Summerside also returned.—S

RAISED DISTURBANCE. Two young men from Charlottetown caused considerable excitement besides creating somewhat of a disturbance Sunday night. The young men, obviously the worse of liquor, drove out of town at a high rate of speed. Citizens who noticed the car took the number and found it to be registered in Charlottetown. Shortly after the car drove away a call came from the outskirts of the town to the effect that two men were fighting on private property there. The call was answered by members of the local police department and by the time they arrived there quite a crowd had gathered although the men in question were not to be seen. One of them was eventually found sitting in the automobile and after a considerable search the other was hiding at the foot of the embankment on the shore. He was arrested charged with drunkenness and released the same night on a \$10 deposit. It has been the custom in the past for young men from Charlottetown to come to this town to blow off steam or make "whoopie." The police will not, however, be inclined to deal so leniently with them in the future.—The Island Farmer.

Extensive dredging operations are going on outside the seawall in preparation. Many other improvements are contemplated including the extension the main highway straight through the town to connect with a track being provided for autos and leading to the ferry. So extensive are preparations for the new ferry that it is expected that the work will be completed in October 1931.—Summerside Journal.

Making Big Preparations for New Car Ferry

Those who have not visited Borden and noticed the extent of the work being carried out there may have no idea of the extensive preparations being made for the putting in operation of the new car ferry. The point jutting into the Strait to the seaward of the railway tracks known as Carleton Head has been cleared of trees and stumped. Men with teams aided by steam shovels have excavated an area of about two acres to a depth of about four feet. This excavation has been surrounded by a wall or dyke forming a catch basin. In this huge basin two tanks are to be installed with a capacity of several tons each, to contain fuel oil for the ferry boats. The tanks are expected to hold a supply for several months and will be supplied by a tank oil steamer. The catch basin will be lined with concrete and will provide against loss of oil in the event of either of the tanks bursting. In addition to this we understand the dock is to be widened some two feet to the seaward and exten-
