Section 56, provision is made for the transfer of insane penitentiary prisoners (those with sentences of two years or more) to provincial mental hospitals when arrangements have been made with the provinces concerned. We understand that the Province of Ontario has made such an arrangement and receives \$1.50 per patient per day.

There seems to be no reason why Prince Edward Island should not secure a similar arrangement, and also attempt to collect for the past care of such cases who are now receiving treatment in Falconwood.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Minister of Health be made responsible for the enforcement of Sections XV, XVI, and XVIII of the act (quoted above), and for deciding as to ability to pay, and for the collection of accounts.

2. That consideration be given to increasing the rates of paying patients.

3. That the Government of Prince Edward Island endeavour to arrange with the Dominion Government for the payment, by the Dominion Government, for the care of insane penitentiary prisoners in Falconwood Hospital, and endeavour also to secure payment for care already given, in the past, to such patients who are now in Falconwood Hospital.
