NORTH WEST QUEEN'S S. S. CONVENTION. Held At Stanley Bridge.

The ninth convention of the N. W. Queen's S. S. Association was held in the Presbyterian Church at Stanley Bridge on Friday, July 14th.

The morning session opened with devotional exercises led by the president, Rev. George Selar. Rev. A. D. Archibald, Field Secretary then conducted the Teachers' Conference and gave valuable hints on preparing and presenting the lesson.

Two preparations are necessary, that of prayer and of study. The teacher must exercise the mind that God has given him. He should begin his preparation early in the week, and for his work he needs, first the Bible, second paper and pencil and third the best helps available.

Rev. Mr. Archibald gave a practical illustration of his methods by teaching one of the International Sunday School lessons.

The afternoon session opened with devotional service led by Wm. Laird.

After a few remarks by the President the minutes of last Convention were read and adopted.

The roll of schools was called and reports heard from thirteen schools. There were present seven superintendents and twelve teachers.

The nominating Committee brought in the following report:— Pres—Wm. Laird. Vice Pres—Rev. George Millar. Sec. Treas—Margaret Ross, Irene Clarke, Assistant.

Additional Executive—A. J. McLeod, Arthur Stimpson, B. Stevenson, A. K. Henry, D. McDonald.

Mr Laird, the newly elected president took the chair and called on the Executive Committee for financial report. Not more than one third the amount apportioned the district had been received by the provincial executive, the balance to be paid before the annual convention. Owing to the absence of Mrs. Belyea and Mr. Moffatt, the Field Secretary then led the discussion on "Some of our difficulties". Those mentioned were—lack of sympathy on the part of parents, lack of study on the part of pupils, difficulty of retaining young people and over-crowding irregular attendance, interesting boys in the lesson and grading the school.

Rev. W. P. Archibald of Springdale, N. S. spoke on the duty of the minister to create an atmosphere of Bible study in the church and so overcome the parents' lack of sympathy. To interest the pupils the teacher must study the lesson thoroughly. He should set some definite work in advance and expect his class to prepare it. When the parents are sufficiently interested to attend the Sunday School no difficulty will be found in keeping the young people then.

The Field Secretary gave a black-board lesson showing how to make our work interesting, instructive and impressive. We should use our imagination to make the Bible stories clear and employ illustrations suited to the child's mind. A decidedly interesting and helpful paper on Normal Work was read by D. Cameron giving clear evidence that Mr. Cameron has the work of the Sunday School at heart.

Evening Session—After devotional service the place of meeting of next convention was discussed. It was decided to leave it in the hands of the Executive Committee.

A. K. Henry read a paper on "Temperance in the Sunday School" followed by remarks along the same line by Rev. Mr. Sellar with special reference to the use of pledge cards. Rev. J. G. Belyea gave an address on "Concerted Action for securing decision for Christ."
