ONE of the Canadian teachers at present in preparation at Chicago for the Consolidated Schools being established by Sir William McDonald writes:—The plan for the improvement of public education, endorsed by Sir William McDonald, of which Professor Robertson has charge, is no doubt now pretty well known. I shall only say that the plan embraces two ideas: 1st, consolidation, and second, the introduction of nature study, manual training, and domestic science into our schools. The teachers here are qualifying in order to take charge of the movement, in general, and are especially preparing themselves to take charge of the nature study part, in particular. A few words concerning the personnel of our parts are now in order. As yet "we are seven"—the two from Ontario and one from Quebec have not been selected. The six maritime province men have rooms in the same building, 6107 Madison avenue. On the way to college, a ten minutes walk, we cross Midway Plaisance, famous because of its many attractions during World's Fair days. Chicago University is certainly a great institution and destined to become still greater. Though but 10 years old, it even now ranks among the great universities of America. There are 15 massive stone buildings and others are being erected; one is modelled after Magdalen College, Oxford. The buildings and grounds include an area of more than 50 acres. In the different departments there is a total of 2,200 students. There are scores of very able professors and instructors. Our chief work is in the department of Botany. Dr. John McCouler is head professor. He is a genial man, and an able, enthusiastic teacher. We look forward with much pleasure to his lectures. The course with him is in plant structures, or the evolution of the plant kingdom. In connection with this course we have seven hours a week laboratory work with the compound microscope. The second course is in plant ecology or plant relations, with Doctors Cowles, an authority in plant ecology. This course consists of a lecture on field work every day. Our third course is in the school of education, and consists of a lecture or discussion every day on methods of nature study and teaching. Dear Jackman is the professor of nature study. In addition to the lecture we have observation work in the primary and secondary grades of the model school, where Professor Jackman's ideas are put into practice. In this school, nature study is made the base for nearly every other study. We find the pupils attentive and bright and doing good work. The kindergarten, manual training and domestic science departments are especially interesting. No doubt you will hear more about this school in the future. The three courses outlined above are those required of us by Professor Robertson. Some of us are doing some extra work.
