Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made only in certain cases. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A homestead house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Each of three years after earning homestead patent also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a home worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C.M.G. Further Particulars of Island Soldier's Death

The following letter has just been received by Mrs. Hector Campbell regarding the death of her son, Bert, who was killed in action on Nov. 8, 1914.

Dear Mrs. Campbell:—I thought I had written to the relatives of all the boys who were killed in my company but possibly as it was some time before I got definite information about the death of your son I may have missed you. I am very sorry if I did, Mrs. Campbell, because I know you all like to get whatever details are available.

Your boy was wounded with the same shell as killed Pte. Burke and another. The three were in the trench together just about fifteen yards from me, and a heavy shell landed right into the trench killing the other two instantly and wounding your son very severely about his legs and stomach and partly burying him. We dug him out right away and did what we could for him but we couldn't get him out until dusk as we were in full view of the enemy. As soon as it got dark enough I detailed a party to carry him out on a stretcher. It was very rough going and it took two men fully six hours to carry him back to the Dressing Station. I didn't expect he would live but the party told me he was still alive and conscious when they handed him over to the medical officer.

You have every reason to be proud of your boy, Mrs. Campbell for he was marvellously brave and set us all a wonderful example of enduring what must have been very severe pain. I helped to dig him out and although we must have caused him a good deal of pain about all he said was, 'I'd like to think I'll live, Captain.' I told him I thought he would and that we were going to get him out as soon as it got dark. His personal belongings you should have had by this time if they were available. They were all left on him when handed over to the M. O. at the Dressing Station. I will make inquiries regarding them, but I feel sure that our paymaster would have forwarded anything he received.

Voice Objections To Doing Away With Lobster Hatcheries

OTTAWA, May 14.—Considerable opposition to the closing of lobster hatcheries in Canada developed at a meeting of the fisheries committee of the House this morning. Evidence submitted by an official of the department was to the effect that a campaign along educational lines was to be carried on among fishermen of the country for the conservation of female lobsters as natural propagation had been found far more satisfactory than the artificial method conducted at the hatcheries.

Some members were of the opinion that the hatcheries should not be abandoned until this campaign had been conducted and fishermen were in a better position to appreciate the need of conservation. They pointed out that while investigation had been conducted regarding the observance of orders in connection with the lobster industry, consultation with the large interests had not been made by the commission investigating.

That in his opinion the government should wait until it discovered how the educational campaign would work among the fishermen before disorganizing its lobster hatcheries through the country was the statement made last night by W. F. Leonard, president of Leonard Fisheries, Ltd., when interviewed relative to the foregoing despatch.

His experience had been that the average fisherman was more or less careless under any condition with seed lobsters and he did not think that the educational campaign suggested by the department would bear in its wake the results desired. He pointed out that he believed that the scheme now in vogue in the United States would, however, bring results, so far as the conservation of the lobster is concerned. Across the border the government buys all the seed lobsters the individual fisherman catches, at a good figure. The fishermen naturally conserve these lobsters

that bring the high price and keep them alive until he disposes of them to the government or the fish packer who is buying for the government.

As these lobsters are secured they are placed in large pounds, constructed by the government, and they are allowed to mature in the natural way and the offspring taken care of. The lobsters not caught mature in their native element and those that are captured are assured of conservation, without the necessity of the operation of hatcheries. Mr. Leonard suggested that this would be a good scheme to be adopted by the Dominion government if it deemed it expedient to do away with its hatcheries.
