HUSBAND'S LIABILITY FOR WIFE UNDER QUE. BEC LIQUOR LAW

MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—By a judgment handed down this morning in the Superior Court, a man is responsible for the actions of his wife if she breaks the Quebec Liquor Law, no matter if he is aware of the fact or not. The case in question is that of James Ingram, a sailor who was sentenced to one month in prison while he was on the high seas, by Judge Bazin, because his wife broke the Liquor Act. When he arrived home he instituted habeas corpus proceedings to have the sentence quashed, but this morning the Superior Court upheld it, referring to Article 97 of the Quebec Liquor Act, which holds that a man is responsible for his wife in this respect.

Most regretfully the moral outlook toward the future is unfavorable. We have Liberal dominance at Ottawa, but paralyzed by warring factions within the Cabinet and in the Parliament. That is a condition tending not merely to the lax administration of prohibition but of all the laws of the land. With Quebec in the "middle," what hope is there of the enforcement of prohibition?

The Liberal leaders in Parliament opposed the hanging of Riel. They glorified the memory of Papineau and William Lyon Mackenzie. The Liberal party has made William Lyon Mackenzie King their leader and now Premier of Canada, who boasts of his grandfather's doings. We may be sure there will be no rebels hanged in Canada under Liberal rule. It is so much nicer to elect them to Parliament as was done in Lyon Mackenzie's and Papineau's time.

What is all this but an invitation to treason and rebellion in Canada, just as the Bell Government's laxity is an invitation to Cunniffness, crime and bootlegging in Prince Edward Island? Think it over!

GROUP GOVERNMENT IS POSSIBILITY IN MANITOBA

WINNIPEG, Jan. 23.—Establishment of group government in Manitoba will be urged on the Legislature this year by A. E. Smith, labor member for Brandon. Mr. Smith will call upon the House to demand the resignation of the Northern Ministry and substitute for it a Ministry selected from all parties in the Legislature. The Labor, Conservative, Independent, Farmer and Government parties would be represented in the Cabinet in proportion to their voting power in the Legislature. Last year a motion calling for group government was defeated by a small majority.

FAST ABEGWEITS DEFEAT SACKVILLE 12-2

The Abbies Cutled Their Opponents at Every Sa e of the Game, in Speed, Combination and Hard Work.

On a good sheet of ice at the Arena last night the Abegweits came out victorious in a one sided score game, their opponents struggling all the way to keep down the score, but were unable to head off the fast team work of the Abbies. This makes the sixth straight win for the home team and by their performance last night, showed better form than ever.

Referee Herrel called the game at 10:10 the late arrival of the train delaying the start, this together with the cold weather kept many fans away, there being only a small attendance, compared with the first matches.

In the first period, Sackville got away to a good start, McAllister scoring after eight minutes of play. The Abbies soon evened up, McEachern tying the score in two minutes, on a pass from Rodd, Kelly receiving in short order on a pass from McEachern, followed by Rodd, Williams and Reid again, the period ending 5-1 in favor of the Abbies.

In the second period, McEachern and Scott had a little difference of opinion which was soon stopped by the Referee's whistle and a couple of McEachern's team mates reminding him there was a hockey match being played.

The second period opened up at 10:22 each team endeavoring to add to their score. Moore succeeding at 10:46 in notching another tally, followed by Buntain four minutes later, after five minutes of rick end rushes. Raimie, Sackville's defence man, who was playing a hard game was rewarded after a rush the length of the ice, from a side shot slipped their goal. The referee's whistle cut the game before the period ended. Gordon once more found the net for the Abbies, on a nice piece of combination from Buntain and Rodd, score 8-2.

The third period was not so fast as the first and second, no doubt the strenuous playing was beginning to tell on both teams. McEachern found the net a half minute after commencing play, repeating in four minutes. Shortly after Gordon on a pass from Proxow scored the rubber, the last count going to Buntain, the game ending 12-2 in Abbies favor.

Kelly, who was playing a fast heady game, retired shortly after the period opened, receiving a cut on the nose.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—A special hearing was held today by Register of Wills Campbell to determine whether the unsigned will of Fido Pasucci, an Italian man, was admitted to probate. 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SENDING REFUGES TO CYPRUS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 23.—Fifteen thousand Greek and Armenian refugees are being sent from this city to the island of Cyprus in ships provided by the Greek government. Twenty thousand other refugees are awaiting transportation but the French authorities are persuading Christians not to go, as they have secured formal guarantees that the Turks will respect their lives and property.
