Prince Hirohito Loses Portfolio

CHERBOURG, June 14—Two special messengers, Hato Zinoshire and Lavki Tikishiro, in charge of a trunk which they were bringing from Tokio to deliver to Crown Prince Hirohito of Japan in Paris, were robbed here today of a portfolio which contained valuable papers and more than \$1,000 in cash. When Zinoshire and Tikishiro landed from the Adriatic the latter carried the portfolio in the side pocket of his overcoat. He missed the papers and money at the very moment that a special train was leaving for Paris. There was time only for him to inform the police. Prince Hirohito left Paris for Brussels to-day.

Decker Is Given Life Imprisonment

WARSAW, IND., June 14—Virgil Decker, 19 years old, was found guilty of murder in the first degree in connection with the death of Leroy Lovett, his associate, by a jury in Circuit Court here tonight. He was sentenced to life imprisonment.

The jury was out less than three hours and reached a verdict on the fifth ballot. Young Decker showed no emotion when the verdict was read to the court or when sentence was passed. He had adopted a nonchalant attitude throughout the trial and seemed in excellent spirits when he was taken back to his cell. The Decker case which has created widespread interest is one of the strangest ever come to the attention of local authorities.

On Saturday night, March 12, an unknown man was found in a dying condition on a railroad crossing near Bourbon, Ind. He was taken to Bourbon, where he died without regaining consciousness. The body was identified as that of Virgil Decker by members of the Decker family. On the following Monday the body was identified by Samuel Lovett, of Elkhart, Ind., as that of his son, Leroy, and on Tuesday night Virgil Decker was arrested at the home of his uncle in Marion, Ind. Young Decker was brought here where he was lodged in jail and a few days later the Kosciusko county jail indicted him, with his two brothers, Calvin and Fred

Decker, for the murder of young Lovett.
The other members of the Decker family are in jail here awaiting trial, the date of which has not yet been set.
During the trial several alleged confessions of Virgil were introduced. In one of the confessions, he is said to have stated he took Lovett to a lonely cabin on Tippecanoe river where he fatally injured him by striking him over the head with a piece of iron. He then took Lovett to the railroad crossing, the written confession as introduced by the state said, where left the unconscious boy seated in a horseless buggy, with the hope that a train would strike the buggy and mangle the form beyond recognition. Virgil Decker was heavily insured, and it was the contention of the state that members of the Decker family had conceived a plot to kill Lovett, who closely resembled Virgil Decker and claim the body as that of Virgil and collect the insurance. Young Decker, in none of his various statements, however, has implicated any other members of his family, it is said.
THE MARKET IS
Demand for Eggs Good—Other Product Quiet.
MONTREAL, June 11.—In sympathy with the higher prices ruling in the country for eggs owing to the smaller receipts and the increased demand for supplies for export account a very firm feeling prevails in the local market, and prices are firmly maintained with fairly active trade passing for the season of the year in a jobbing way. The receipts yesterday were 2,794 cases, as against 3,878 for the same day last week, and 2,710 for the corresponding day a year ago.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows:
Selected eggs 34c to 35c
Straight receipts 32c to 33c
No. 1 candled stock 30c to 31c
No. 2 candled stock 28c to 29c
The market for maple product was without any new feature to note, prices being steady on account of the small offerings on spot. The demand for domestic consumption was somewhat limited and trade was rather quiet in maple syrup at \$2.10 to \$2.25 per gallon, and light colored maple sugar sold at 22c to 23c per lb., and dark at 20c to 21c.
There was no change in the condition of the market for potatoes, business in car lots being very quiet, which indicates that spot buyers have ample stocks on hand to meet their immediate requirements, and prices were nominally unchanged for Green Mountains at 60c to 65c per bag of 90 lbs., 70c to 75c, and for Quebec stock track, while in the jobbing way sales for small lots were made at 80c to 85c per bag of 80 lbs., ex-store.
New York, June 9.—Eggs irregular. Receipts 37,393 cases. Fresh gathered, extra firsts, 28c to 30c; firsts, 25 1-2c to 27 1-2c; State, Pennsylvania and nearby western hennery, whites, firsts to extras, 30c to 38c; State, Pennsylvania and nearby western hennery, browns, extras, 33c to 34c; do. gathered browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 26 1-2c to 32c; storage packed, extra firsts, 29c to 30c; do. average run, 27 1-2c to 29c.
MONTREAL, June 10.—According to advices from country points there has been a marked falling off in the receipts of eggs and the prices have advanced for all way. Ontario track shippers have been paying stores and producer 25c to 28c per dozen, and making sales of current receipts at 27c to 29c f. o. b. cases returned with some shippers asking as high
