# THE REPORT ON THE DOMINION FISHERIES FOR THE YEAR 1903.

Possibly the Most Interesting Portion of the Report is That with Regard to the Dog Fish Pest, For Which Several Remedies Are Suggested by Professor E. L. Prince, Dominion Commissioner of Fisheries.

The report of the Dominion fisheries for 1903 has been brought down. During the year 77,861 men were engaged in the Canadian fisheries, employing gear and craft to the value of \$11,305,950. The lobster fishery alone employed 13,563 persons. During the last fiscal year \$11,828,646 worth of fish products were exported from Canada. The Dominion expenditure on the fisheries service was \$327,984, and the revenue was \$78,635.  
Possibly the most interesting portion of the report to the maritime provinces is that with regard to the dog fish pest, for which several remedies are suggested by Professor E. L. Prince, Dominion Commissioner of fisheries. Mr. Prince gives a most interesting account of the habits of various kinds of miniature sharks, collectively known as dog fish, and while recognizing the gravity of the present plague, says there is no cause for serious alarm that the existing scourge is likely to be permanent. Like all the shark tribe, the dog fishes are essentially restless wanderers. They resemble wolves in their habit of roving in great herds or schools and on account of their voracity soon exhaust the supply of food in limited areas either by devouring or by driving the fish away. Thus they are compelled to move from place to place in search of new supplies of food. As a rule, says the professor, they strike in the Bay of Fundy waters about July 1st and move off in September. There is good reason to believe that the shark and dog fishes which as a rule occur sparingly along the shores of Canada, are really wanderers from elsewhere, most likely from the warmer waters of the United States coast. On the other hand, it may be that the vast herds of dog fish which in recent times infest the coast of the maritime provinces are transatlantic visitors, whose original haunts may be the western waters of Europe. On the western coast of Ireland and Scotland, where the gulf stream spends itself, these pests are frequently a serious trouble. Dog fish, says Prof. Prince cannot long stand cold water. To stamp out the pest will be asserted require international co-operation, as the young brood must be exterminated as well as the larger specimens.

## THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

FRIDAY, April 15.  
House met at 12:45  
Hon. Mr. Hughes presented a petition from Benjamin Rogers Sr., George J. Rogers and others praying for an Act to incorporate "The Rogers Hardware Company Limited."  
A bill in accordance therewith was read a first time and referred to the Private Bills Committee.  
Hon. Mr. Gordon asked the Commissioner of Public Works if any steps have been taken to repair the Carleton Ferry Wharf in order to safeguard the lives of passengers, and, if not already ordered, will any repairs be done to the wharf this spring?  
Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said that two or three years ago this wharf was carried away by a storm. It was repaired at a expense of \$700 but now at low water passengers have difficulty landing from a large boat. He had enquired of parties there as to the remedy and was informed that a "stage 90 feet in length would give the entire wharf and extend it to deep water, would cost more than the expenditure warranted, especially as no shipping was done there. He expected to have work done this fall.  
Hon. Mr. Gordon asked the Commissioner of Public Works, if any contract or arrangement has been made for completing repairs on the Public Sewer in Georgetown, in order to prevent a recurrence of the heavy losses sustained by individuals from the rush of water into their cellars.  
Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said that there has been an old sewer at Georgetown, that has stopped up. It will be repaired as soon as the condition of the ground permits.  
Mr. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works why the proposed road from St. Mary's Road to Sturgeon line road for which the right of way was paid in 1900 was not opened.  
Also why the proposed road from Murray River Bridge to Wilnot Road, Lot 64, for which the right-of-way was paid in 1900 was not opened, and what action the Government intend taking in the matter.  
Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said that the first mentioned road was laid off a few years ago, but never opened up. There have not been any complaints, but the matter will be investigated this spring and will be opened up if found to be in the public interest.  
Mr. McKinnon asked the Hon. Attorney General to lay on the table of the House the report of Stipendiary Magistrates for Kings, Queens and Prince Counties for the year ending 1903.

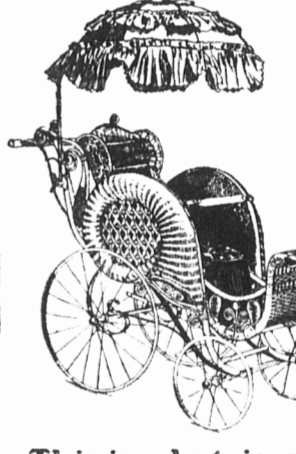
