Two Escape Stony Mountain Prison

Winnipeg, May 16 - (CP) - R.C.M.P. Superintendent O.W. Harvison said today that two convicts, one of them considered "dangerous," escaped today from the Stony Mountain Penitentiary 18 miles north of here. He identified them as: Clifford Montgomery, 32, and Percy Mogy, 45. Braiding Mogy as "dangerous," he said that both men had been sentenced at Fort Arthur, Ont., to four year prison terms. Montgomery was sentenced in July 1948 and Mogy in June of the same year. Superintendent Harvison said that he did not know details of the escape. The R.C.M.P. official said both men have long records.
