**SCHOONER REFLAGGED.**—Mrs. Leonard Wood, Lot 48, has received a letter from Mr. Wood, informing her that his vessel, the Joseph McGill, was successfully floated on Friday after being ashore for three days off Bear Island, N. S. In order to float the vessel it was necessary to throw overboard a large portion of her cargo of produce. The vessel is leaking considerably but will be able to proceed under her own sail on her voyage to Sydney.

**KARAKULE SHEEP.**—Dr. C. C. Young went to Sumner'side yesterday accompanied by Mr. Alfred Bourget who is now en route to St. Petersburg where he will report among other things on the fox industry. Dr. Young will meet the second consignment of Karakule sheep for the Jenkins-Tidmarsh-Owen Syndicate in which he holds half interest. The number of sheep in this herd will be forty-five. The Dennis-Jones Syndicate and the one just named now hold control of six of the seven sources of unrelated Karakule blood in America.

**NEW ZEALAND GONE.**—Relying on her oil fuel supply and the coal bunkered at the dockyard to take her across the Atlantic, H. M. dreadnought cruiser New Zealand sailed from Halifax on Sunday evening for Portsmouth to complete her circle of the globe. It is now twenty days since the collier Invergyre sailed from Cardiff with Welsh coal for the New Zealand, and she has not been reported so far. Storm conditions on the Atlantic are stated by officers of incoming ships to be such as might easily delay a heavily laden tramp a week.

**WEDDING BELLS.**—A very pretty wedding took place in Marshfield, Nov. 26th, when Mary Lyda Vickerson, of Sedly, Sask., was united in marriage to Gordon Lang Buntain of Marshfield. **SCHR. P. E. I.—BOUND ASHORE.**—The schooner Minnie and Monica, 7 tons, of New Brunswick, from Halifax to Summerside, P. E. I., was driven ashore near Cape Jack, Ant., on Wednesday night of last week. Her cargo, consisting of gasoline, kerosene, oil, paints, etc., was removed on Friday and Saturday of last week to Crispo's warehouse, Harbour Bouche. It had suffered comparatively little injury. On Saturday the schooner was taken off. She has proceeded to Port Hawkesbury, and after some temporary repairs will go to Newfoundland. The cargo was to be sold at public auction on Thursday afternoon last.

**MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION.**—The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Ministerial Association was held yesterday morning at the Y. M. C. A. building, Charlottetown. Rev. J. Cleary occupied the chair. The committee appointed to prepare a program for the Week of Prayer made a partial report recommending:—1—The use in part of the program of the World's Evangelical Alliance. 2—That the programs be published in previous years. 3—That the addresses be brief, ten minutes at the most, and that as much time as possible be given to prayer. The Committee was instructed to bring in a further report on the names of the speakers and the churches at which the services will be held. The dates for the Week of Prayer this year are Jan. 4-8, 1914. Rev. D. McLean was elected President and Rev. Z. L. Ash, Secy-Treas. for the ensuing year.

**THE C. H. I. C. SCARE.**—With respect to the uneasiness existing among local contract-holders in the Canadian Home Investment Company regarding their status in the concern as reorganized through its purchase by another corporation, the following telegram which was received here last night by Mr. G. Russell Beer, the Company's Superintendent in P. E. Island, will be of interest. The telegram is a copy of one sent to the Provincial Superintendent of the C. H. I. C., Mr. Miles D. Emack, of St. John, N. B., from Vancouver, under date of Nov. 26th, and reads as follows: "No cause for alarm. New company capitalized five millions. Quarter million already taken up, and stock selling ten per cent. premium. One million preferred set aside for contract holders wishing for stock. C. H. I. C. will be a subsidiary company. Exchange of stock optional with contract-holders. All Superintendent's a copy of this immediately. (Signed) T. B. Taylor."

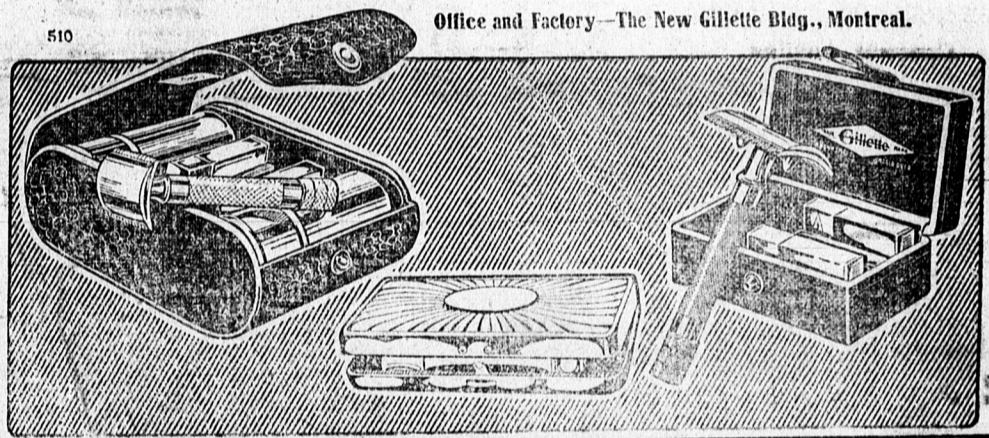
