not send it over the Senate as everyone knew then an election was pending.

"The proposal of a Union Government was discussed in Cabinet. Some of the ministers were in favor and some were opposed. I got tired and said that I would make my own decision. I saw Sir Wilfrid and made an appointment with him. He came to my house the next day. Just before this we had introduced the Military Service Bill.

Proposes a Union Government formed

"As you know, Union Government was formed and sustained. Its Cabinet never divided on party lines. There would be differences of opinion, of course, but the division usually found a Liberal agreeing with a Conservative as against another Liberal. Two of the strongest Tories in Union Government were classified as Liberals."

"Sir Robert said that in 1913 he went back to England to attend meetings of the Imperial War Cabinet which he was a member as Prime Minister of Canada. "There was an occasion in June, 1918, in the Cabinet where my observations were so frank and critical that Lloyd George called back General Wilson. Lord Milner whispered to me, 'What you said will be answered,' but this day my criticism has not been answered."

"Sir Robert said that as a result of his criticism a committee had been formed to see what further effort was necessary to win the war. "From first to last, not one, not even one of the soldiers believed that the war could be ended that year," said Sir Robert. "The Allies did not know to what extent the spirit of the German people had been broken. The speaker said that the committee had made a wonderful report but the war came to an end shortly after it had been written."

has been discussed by various council boards during the last sixteen years, and which at the present time has become almost an absolute necessity. Lack of housing room for the increased amount of equipment used by the city, and the necessity of remodeling the main building have warranted the new project.

The annex will be two stories high, about 40x40, and will be built on the north side of the main building. The work will be under the supervision of the city engineer and with day labor. Some changes that will not meet with the approval of the citizens is being made in respect to the hiring of help—no one man will be kept on continuously, every laboring man will receive a share of the work.

The barn on the site where the annex is to be built is being torn down to make room for the new structure which will house all the fire apparatus on the ground floor. On the upper floor will be quarters for fire and police departments will be able to indulge in gymnastics and other recreation.

The old fire hall will be used for housing all city machines and here also will be located an up-to-date and roomy work shop where minor repairs which hitherto were sent out, on account of lack of space may now be made to city machines.

Attention is also given the police station which will be entirely remodelled. Here the floor will be lowered on a level with the street. The present unsanitary cells will be discarded and replaced by sanitary steel cells. The chief's office will be removed to the section now occupied by the cells.

The chief's office and the quarters now occupied by the caretaker, Mr. Matheson, will be made into one large office which will be occupied by the commissioners of water and sewers and this change will no doubt be approved by the many householders who now are compelled to climb two flights of stairs to reach the present office.

The city engineer and the judge of the City Court will have offices on the upper floor of the new annex.

In this new portion will also be store rooms allotted for different purposes, including for storing city fuel, which will eliminate the usual yearly shortage in this line.

It is presumed the allotment provided under the Act will practically cover the cost.

The work of remodeling the old building adjoining was begun yesterday morning.

Summerside Supreme Court

(Special to the Guardian) SUMMERSIDE, Nov. 28—On the resumption of the Supreme Court at Summerside on Friday morning the case against Roy and Bayfield Yeo was continued, the evidence for the defense being heard. Roy Yeo, one of the two prisoners in the case was the first witness. His story of the events of the night of July 28th was very different from that of the Crown witnesses. He denied having struck Enman in the store, but stated that after Enman had struck his brother Kenneth with a bottle and knocked him out in the store and attacked him, the witness then struck Enman with his fists twice, knocking him down each time. He then went in and dragged his brother out. The following witnesses also gave evidence for the defense: John Ballum, Bayfield Leo and Delmar McArthur. Their evidence was for the most part the same as at the preliminary hearing. The deposition of Gerald Yeo now in New York, taken at the preliminary examination was read to the jury as part of the case for the defence. That closed the case for the defence. The Crown called two witness in rebuttal and the Court ordered that the case be adjourned until ten o'clock this morning when Counsel will address the Court. Before adjournment, Mr. John Herbert Thomas of Albany, was appointed a Commissioner in Prince County for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court. S.

Judge H.L. Palmer Addresses Legion

The regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L. was addressed last night by Judge H. L. Palmer on the subject "Service." His Honour as President of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, referred to the origin of Rotary and stressed the common ideals of that great international club and the speaker emphasized in service. The Legion, especially in service. The speaker frankly yields priority in point of service to the Canadian Legion, who, His Honour declared, far surpassed all other organizations in this regard. He eulogized the Legion very highly, pointing out the exclusive nature of its membership, declaring that every worth while citizen in Canada would give much for the right to belong, and urged the Legionaires to continue to lead the way and set an example for all other Service Clubs. Returned men a "marked men" especially are the objects of veneration, the speaker felt, to the rising generation, and he made a strong plea to his hearers to keep this in mind and to cooperate whole-heartedly in supporting their great organization. He made some humorous references to the ancient Army custom of "passing the buck," but reminded Legionaires that only voluntary and sincere work on the part of every member would make success in their efforts possible. He quoted the 6th object of Rotary, which emanated from a former Charlottetownian, and which is closely allied to Legion objects, i.e. the promotion of Peace through the fostering of an international spirit of good-will and co-operation.
