CREATURES THAT CANNOT BE CAUGHT

It was recently reported that photographs have been obtained of a notorious, an almost unknown flightless bird, of which only four specimens have ever been secured. There are many other birds and beasts at large in various parts of the world of which not even photographs can be obtained, and the zoological societies would pay substantial sums for specimens of them.

There is a nameless creature living in the region of the Andes, for instance, that has so far escaped capture. It has been seen by various travellers, and bones and other remains that have been discovered bear out the belief that it has been discovered. The animal is a true member of the cat family—but a rather terrifying member, since it is the Then there is the okapi, an animal known to exist in certain parts of the Congo forest. It was discovered, just over twenty years ago, by Sir Harry Johnston, who believed it to be of the same species fossilized remains which were found in Greece. The subsequent discovery of some skulls and a complete hide, however, proved the okapi to be an unknown animal, apparently a cross between the giraffe and zebra.

Another creature still at large is the mylodon, a species of the ground sloth. Some few years ago Hesketh Pritchard, the author and big game hunter, let an expedition into Patagonia in search of this beast. Although no mylodon was captured, it is firmly believed that specimens of the creature are still at large there.

A great deal of interest was aroused by the reports regarding the discovery of the Congo of a huge beast weighing about a hundred tons and covered with "armor." Nothing further has been heard of this animal, however, nor has the water-elephant, also said to live in the same part, been captured. On the other hand, a new animal of the hog species has been run to earth, as also has a species of the mouse-deer.

Among the birds that zoologists would welcome may be mentioned the bell bird, which has often been heard singing in a clear, bell-like tone, but never yet caught.

MANY ATTEND FUNERAL FOR N. D. TRAPPER

Angus J. Nicholson, Pioneer Trapper, Laid to Rest at Stewartsdale

Angus J. Nicholson, pioneer resident of Burleigh county, died suddenly of heart trouble Tuesday, Sept. 4 at Glencoe at the age of 80 years.

Mr. Nicholson was born at Valleyfield, Prince Edward Island, Canada July 1843 and lived there continuously until 1882 when he came to North Dakota. Since that date he spent most of his time in this state, returning at intervals to his old home at Prince Edward Island. He located a homestead in Morton county, near Huff. Before making final proof, however, the Missouri river cut him off and made an island of his claim. The island now known as Nicholson's island was a port of call for the river boats in the early days when the steamers used wood and Mr. Nicholson supplied these boats with wood for many years.

Mr. Nicholson is best known as a trapper. He was unusually successful as a trapper and his skill in dressing his furs enabled him to obtain the highest prices. Although advanced in years Mr. Nicholson kept young and fresh in mind and it was always a pleasure to meet and converse with him and learn of his knowledge of woodcraft and the habits of fur-bearing animals.

He is survived by five sons, John W., who resides on the old homestead on Prince Edward Island; Archie and Ronald of Buchanan Valley, Emmons county; Malcolm and Donald of Glencoe, and one daughter, Mrs. Annie Smith of Glencoe.

Funeral services were held at Westminster Presbyterian church at Stewartsdale Sept. 6 with Rev. Mateson in charge. The large crowd in attendance gave evidence of the high esteem in which the deceased was held by the people of the surrounding country. Acting as pallbearers were the following friends: William McDonald, John Clark, C. C. Mills, W. J. Brown, R. Boyd, and Dan Falconer. —Bismark Tribune

ROMAN REMAINS IN BRITAIN

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Sept. 21.—The excavations of Roman remains which were renewed on the site of the ancient Richborough Castle, near Sandwich, Kent, a few days ago have brought to light a number of fresh treasures of particular interest.

Under the guidance of experienced members of the Society of Antiquaries, about a dozen men are at work on the grassy land within the area of the walls of the historic castle, cutting new trenches between the Mystery Cross and the North turret. This appears to be a stretch of territory hitherto unexplored, but offering a rich mine of interest.

Last year, when some excavations were made at the castle, which is under the control of the British Office of Works, a great number of pieces of ancient pottery were found, together with some specimens of beautiful glassware which are reputed to be of Roman origin. It is remarkable that each expedition which sets out to probe the soil finds new treasures, and the present exploration party has been even more successful than some of its predecessors during the last century.

This week many new pieces of pottery, bones and horns of animals were found in the trenches that have been cut, but by far the most valuable find was a large piece of stone about the size of a woman. The head is missing, but the outline of the body is well preserved, and it is possible that the stone, found a few feet below the surface, was used to mark the resting-place of a woman of noble birth who died at Richborough during the Roman occupation. The relic is of sandstone, and it is believed that it must have been im-

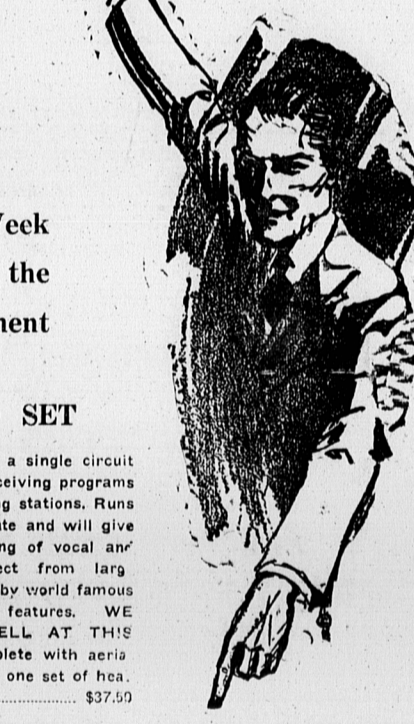
