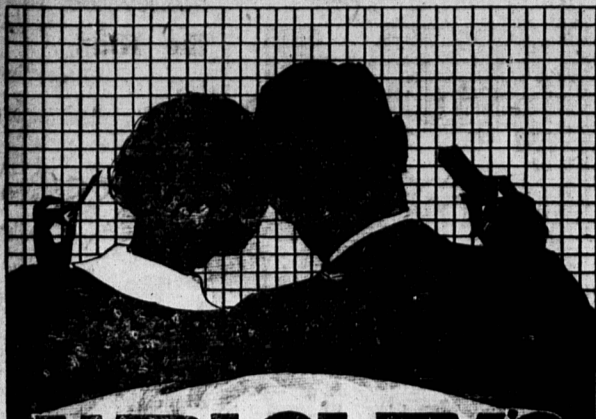

REFRESHER COURSE FOR PHYSICIANS

It is announced that this year's refresher course for physicians, which has proved so popular in past years, will begin on September fifth and continue for five days. While the programme has not yet been completed, it is known that the Dalhousie faculty will have the assistance of eminent members of several other medical schools, including Dr. R. D. Riggall, of the University of Toronto, Dr. B. M. Randall, of George Washington University, Dr. R. E. Powell, of McGill University and Dr. L. J. Austin of Queen's University. It is expected that the new professor of pathology, Dr. Ralph P. Smith, will take part in the instruction. The plan of giving up the mornings to clinics at the different hospitals, which has proved so satisfactory in previous years, will be continued. The afternoons will be given over mainly to lectures by the visiting clinicians. From the number of inquiries that have been received, the committee of arrangements expect a large attendance. Afternoon lectures will be completed in time to permit those in attendance to indulge in golf & other forms of recreation.

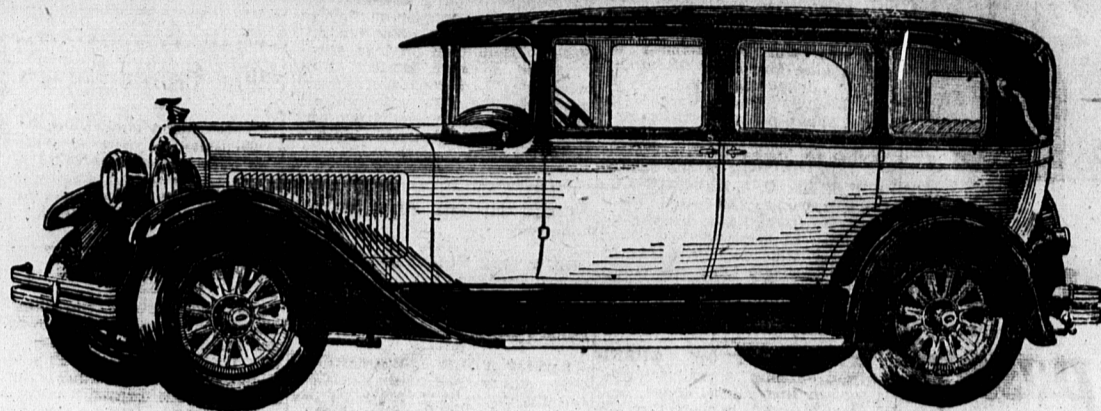
