In the ladies' singles, Miss Marjorie Leeming, of Victoria, the defending champion, remains Canada's best bet. Wright appears to be playing up to his usual standard and is the hope of Canada to win the championship at present, held by Leon de Hurene, of Seattle.

Double Meet At Halifax, Aug. 6

MONCTON, N. B., July 29.—Bliss A. Bourgeois, New Brunswick representative on the Olympic committee, in an interview tonight, gave out the following statement in connection with the Olympic trials meet for the Maritimes to be held in Halifax on August 5th: "New Brunswick athletes desirous of an opportunity to qualify for the Olympic trials in Toronto, August 20th, will go to Halifax and take part in the trial meet being held there August 6th. In view of the decision of the New Brunswick clubs against holding a sectiona meet for this province, I think it would be a very fine thing if all the clubs in New Brunswick decided to take part in the larger meet at Halifax, especially as the Olympic trials are being combined with the Maritime championships. Athletes intending to compete in the Olympic trials there should send their entries along at once either to A. C. Pettipas of Halifax or myself. All entries will be welcomed so long as they have amateur cards duly issued by the M. P. B. A. A. U. of C.

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, July 29.—A doctor beat two gunmen at their own game last night, killing them both when they attempted to rob him. The robbers, who have not been identified, posed as patients on entering the doctor's offices but the physician Frank L. Nathanson, recently had been robbed and was suspicious. He stood by his desk and when they drew their guns he pulled open a drawer, whipped out a pistol and fired before they could level their weapons. One fell dead, but the other staggered out and fell down the stairway into the arms of a policeman who had heard the shots. He died in a hospital.

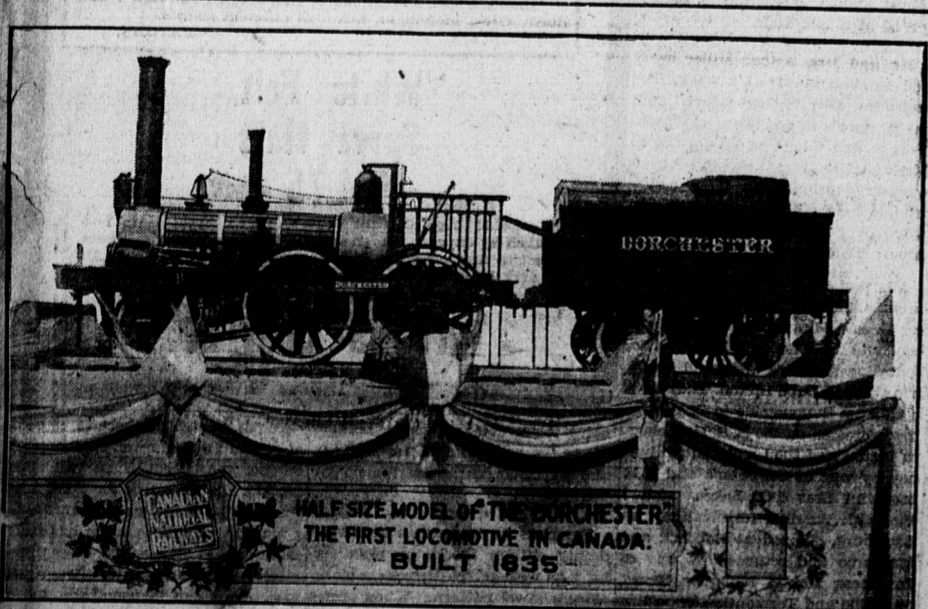

Canada's First Locomotive Reproduced



HALF SIZE MODEL OF THE DORCHESTER THE FIRST LOCOMOTIVE IN CANADA BUILT 1835

The "Dorchester" was the name of the first locomotive placed in service in Canada and it was in use on the Champlain and St. Lawrence Railroad, built in 1835 and connecting L'Annapolis and St. Johns, Quebec, a distance of 16 miles. The "Dorchester" was built in England by the Stephenson. The original line now forms part of the Canadian National Railway system. On the occasion of the annual procession of the St. Jean Baptiste Society at Montreal where a series of floats representing historical subjects were features, the "Dorchester", built at the Point St. Charles shops of the Canadian National Railway, was seen. Afterwards the reincarnation of the first Canadian locomotive appeared in the Diamond Jubilee parade at Ottawa.

To Participate In Olympic Games

(Canadian Press) PARIS, July 29.—The French Olympic committee has reached an official decision to participate in the Olympic games at Amsterdam in 1928. The committee had previously decided not to participate but an advance of 1,000,000 francs by Francois Coty, proprietor of the Figaro, as well as a public subscription amounting to 500,000 francs led to a reconsideration.

Many Deaths Caused By Explosion

(Canadian Press) HANKOW, China, July 29.—More than 150 soldiers and civilians were killed and hundreds injured as a consequence of an unexplained fire at an army ammunition base at Wuchang across the Yangtze, from Hankow yesterday. Most of the deaths were caused by the explosion of gunpowder and bullets. The entire district surrounding the base was reduced to ruin. Missionary properties in the explosion zones were wrecked.
