RISE IN FARM VALUES.

The United States Bulletin of Agriculture takes note of a very favorable increase in farm values, which is reported to be pretty general all over the country. In New York state where the average value of farm lands in 1900 was \$43.58 the value had advanced to \$51.31 in 1905. The increase in the five years was over 18 per cent. The causes of this advance are quite easily apparent. The growth of the cities, the multiplication of industries, and the much more rapid increase of urban than of rural population, together with the fact that about all the good farm lands in the United States are now occupied, have been the main and permanently acting causes. The general prosperity of the period has been a contributory and more transient cause of the advance.

The fact is that with the rapidly growing population of the United States something of the land-hunger of the Old World is already coming in and must inevitably be more and more felt. It is already operating to bring American farmers across the line into our North West and this movement too will grow. Although vacant land is still abundant in Canada, it is now being rapidly taken up and increasing greatly in value when once occupied. These are all conditions that point to increased demand and higher values for land in the older Provinces as well. It is therefore a good time for those possessing farm land in Canada to hold on to it. It will not be surprising if within a short period we shall have an advance in the value of farms equal to that officially recorded in New York and amounting to three or four per cent per annum.

SUMMERSIDE WATER WORKS.

The big fire has solved once for all the problem of water supply for Summerside. A citizen's meeting has resolved that a system of water supply shall be put in and also that the Town shall acquire and operate an electric light system. There can be no doubt of the wisdom of the first of these two propositions, and little doubt in regard to the second if the matter is judiciously handled. It is gratifying to note the courageous and progressive spirit in which the citizens there confront their heavy losses. They are passing through a trying experience such as befalls many cities and towns and are following the well-approved precedents by which disaster may be made the spur to progress.

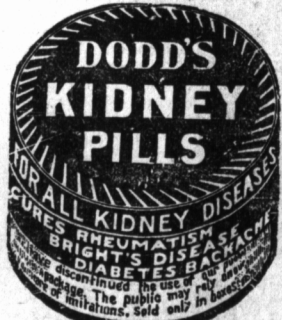
MORNING AND EVENING LIGHT.

Patrons of the electric light system, whether householders, or merchants, remark upon the fact that the current for their incandescent lamps is not available early enough in the evening nor late enough in the morning. In these rapidly shortening days the darkness comes earlier and lingers later day by day. As is well known rooms that are lighted from windows on the eastward side have sufficient light from the sun much earlier in the morning and lose it earlier in the afternoon than those having a western exposure. Hence, while the present hours for incandescent lighting may be satisfactory to some, this is by no means true of all. In the old days of "flat rates" it was clearly to the interest of the Light and Power Company to shorten the hours of service as much as possible. With their patrons paying by meter it cannot be a matter of much difference to the Company.

We mention the matter in no carping spirit. There is, fortunately a better feeling between the general public and the Company since the last settlement, and we assume that a general desire exists to get along harmoniously. This feeling would be fostered, the consumption of electric light and the revenue of the Company in a perceptible measure increased were the current made available for those who require it earlier in the afternoons and later in the mornings than has been the rule of late. Householders who have to light lamps for the preparatory work of getting both breakfast and supper when they think the electric current ought to be available, are sometimes moved to discard the electric altogether. We trust the Company will give this matter their early and most favorable consideration.

When St. John suffered by the terrible fire of 1877 Summerside was but a village, but we are reliably informed that its people contributed nearly \$1,100 towards the relief of St. John at that time. Summerside is now suffering and St. John is prosperous.

St. John Conservatives have done well to recognise the able and zealous services of S. D. Scott, late editor of the Daily Sun. He was while at that post a tower of strength to them, and they should have kept him there at whatever cost. With Mr. Scott's removal St. John has ceased to have a Conservative newspaper organ. The Sun has become a Liberal journal and the great loss to the Opposition party has not been supplied. But there is a plenty of good newspapers in St. John of both the independent and Liberal varieties.



The Examiner would like to join in the general thanksgiving, but somewhat doubtfully recalls certain "drawbacks." Among which it sets down "corrupt Governments and a short crop."

A Southport correspondent writes: "Summerside has been visited by one of the most disastrous fires that has ever occurred in our Province. Many are homeless and reduced to poverty and misery. Cold winter is not far off. He gives twice who gives quickly."

The Patriot says the Dominion Government has acknowledged the principle that no reduction will be made in the per capita subsidy to a Province because of its decrease in population. We shall be glad to find that this is true. Our doubts arise from the terms of the resolutions adopted at the recent Conference which would make the subsidy payable only on the actual population as shown by the census. On this basis we would stand to lose the 80 cents per head on the 6,000 decrease in our population. More discussion of the matter in the Conference would in no way qualify the terms of the resolutions adopted, in which we fall to find any reference to the contingency of a decrease.

No, brother Patriot, we are not disposed to argue that it would be better, or worse, to be "out of line" with the Government at Ottawa. That depends. We simply pointed out that the Conservative Government and people of Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia have fared quite as well in the subsidy adjustment as those Liberal Governments and people of the other Provinces who were "in line." This fact seems indisputable and it knocks out a good deal of party advocacy that is current at election times.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting land so not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entries must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the homestead, the homesteader may, established by sworn person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the homesteader may, established by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, Ottawa, of intention to apply for the land. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior, N.
