The late Mrs. Dwan who was the widow of the late Richard Dwan was a native of Grand River and lived at St. Peters Bay until three years ago, when she moved to Summerside, where she passed away at 11 o'clock Sunday night. She leaves to mourn one daughter, Miss Marie Dwan, Summerside also two brothers Dr. A. J. MacDonald, Richmond and Mr. Roderick MacDougall, Summerside.

—TOWN COUNCIL.—At the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council last night a motion was adopted to establish electric day power in Summerside, commencing April 15th. It was decided to extend the electric light street line farther out at the east end of the town and place five street lights on the line. A motion was moved and carried to widen a narrow part of Central Street at the north end. Mr. Jos. P. Arsenault was appointed assistant electrical engineer for the town at a salary of \$18 per week. Applications for positions in the Electric Department were read from George Sudbury and Alonzo Larkins. Capt. Allan addressed the Council on behalf of latter. The applications were left over until next meeting. A motion was moved to be forwarded to the Daughters of the Empire of Summerside, expressing appreciation to the ladies for their excellent work in collecting clothing and foodstuffs for the miners relief. His Worship the Mayor reported for the Board of Health that there were two cases of scarlet fever in Summerside, and that they had been isolated and every precaution taken to prevent further infection. Councillor Strong reported that several requisitions had been made in valuation for assessment amounting to \$3,600.
