## IN MEMORIAM

REV. S. D. MCPHEE.

The Rev. A. J. McNeill, of Murray River, returned Wednesday night from Avonmore, Ont. He accompanied home to the Island the remains of the late Rev. S. D. McPhee. The body was taken yesterday afternoon to the home of the deceased's sister, Mrs. James A. Nicholson at "rwell Cove. The funeral services will be held in St. John's Church, Belfast today, beginning at 2 o'clock p. m. The cortege will leave Mr. Nicholson's residence for the church at 1 o'clock. Interment will be in the old Belfast Cemetery.

Unfortunately, Mr. McNeill did not arrive in Avonmore in time to bid his friend, the late Mr. McPhee farewell. The latter passed away at eight o'clock on Sunday morning, the 27th inst., and Mr. McNeill reached there at eleven o'clock the same night.

Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian Church at Avonmore, of which the deceased was pastor, on Monday at 2 o'clock. These were conducted by the Presbytery of Glenegary. Sixteen ministers were present, and the interior of the church, including the gallery, was crowded to its capacity. The funeral sermon was preached by the Rev. A. B. McLeod of Cornwall, Ont., a native of Springton, P. E. Island.

Shortly after the ceremony, the body was taken to the train. Mrs. McPhee accompanied her husband's remains, and will return shortly to her home in Avonmore.

The late Mr. McPhee was a native of Heatherdale, Prince Edward Island, but removed with his parents in early childhood to Glen William, King's County. After graduating from Prince of Wales College, he taught school for about ten years in different districts, and was rightly regarded as one of the most capable and painstaking teachers of his time. Subsequently, he studied for the ministry at Auburn Seminary, New York, and the Presbyterian College at Halifax, from the latter of which he graduated as a minister. His first charge was at Union Centre and Loch Aber, Nova Scotia, from which he was called to Murray Harbor South. After laboring there three years, he was called to Belfast and, about four years ago, removed to Avonmore, where he has ever since ministered to the Presbyterian congregation there.

At the last meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, a unanimous and hearty call from his native congregation of Caledonia was sustained and forwarded to the Presbytery of Glenegary, of which the late Mr. McPhee was a member, but, before he had received it however, he had answered the higher call.

The late Mr. McPhee was zealous in his ministry and exemplified in his daily walk and conversation that he worked "as ever in the great Task-master's eye." He was a preacher of exceptional ability and this, coupled with his magnetic personality, made him a power for good. He was a lovable character and a Christ-like minister, beloved by his people and eminently respected by all classes and creeds. He has been called away in the prime of his manhood, leaving behind him a record of sacrifice and service which will remain fragrant in the recollections of all who knew him.

A widow and four children are left to cherish his memory. It is a deep regret to Mr. McNeill that he did not reach the home of his late brother clergyman and beloved friend in time to see him before he had passed away.

**BUYING FOXES.**—Several of the directors of the Dominion Fox Ranching Company, of Murray Harbor, among them Messrs W. H. Prowse and Willard L. Jordan, of Murray Harbor, J. E. Sterns of Souris, and M. McLean, of Montague, were in the city yesterday, making arrangements for the purchase of a third pair of foxes for their ranch.

**FLOOD OF BLUE FOXES.**—A great number of blue foxes has been brought to the Island from Alaska by Mr. E. Milligan, of Northam, who arrived in the city on Wednesday night. He brought no fewer than about forty pairs of these foxes, the breeding of which will now probably considerably develop, in view of this tremendous influx.

**MORE MOTOR CARS.**—Mr. D. C. McKay, the sales manager of the Nova Scotia Motor Car Co., Ltd., the makers of the popular McKay motor car, who was in Charlottetown for several days recently, left yesterday after having done a good business on behalf of his principals. He took with him a goodly number of orders for motor cars for the Island for next year. Among them is an indent for a forty-horsepower touring car, which is to be painted all scarlet red, and is to be known as the "Red Devil."

**AFRON SALE.**—In the Market Hall last evening there was held a highly successful "Hallowe'en Tea and Apron Sale" in aid of the Charlottetown Hospital. The proceeds of the sale will go towards the establishment of a laundry in connection with the hospital. In the hall were numerous tables, each overwhelmingly stocked with alluring and prettily arranged refreshments, and the decorative air of the place reflected considerable credit on those responsible for the affair. The sale was well patronized, there being present a large number of ladies and gentlemen. Special mention must be made of a donation by Mr. Hogg of \$20.55.

**SALE OF LUMBER.**—The jettisoned lumber which formed part of the deck-load of the Norwegian steamer Bjorgvin that ran ashore on Indian Rocks, Wood Islands, several weeks ago, and had to be lightened in this manner in order that she might be floated, was sold at auction on Wednesday on the scene of the stranding, where the lumber lay piled up along the shore for several miles. The two points of the sale were at the breakwaters at Wood Islands and Belle River, where most of the lumber was washed up. The sale was conducted by Mr. Benjamin Carter, of Charlottetown, and the weather being ideal, there was a large attendance of bidders, who came to the venue by water and land. The lumber consisted of spruce deal of the best quality, having been specially selected for the European market; its quantity was about 250,000 feet. It was sold in lots to suit purchasers, and the average price realized was \$10 a thousand feet. The largest purchase was made on behalf of the Government, one lot of 107,000 feet being sold to them; the balance being disposed of in smaller lots to various purchasers. The sale proved very successful. The auctioneer, Mr. Carter, and Mr. Walter B. Robertson, the Collector of Customs who had attended the sale, returned to the city by yesterday morning's train.
