MIRTH AND MUSIC AT GUARDIAN STILTS RACE

Music and fun galore is promised the citizens of Charlottetown on Monday evening next when the Guardian Stilt Races will be run off on the grounds adjoining the Prince of Wales College. Two bands have been arranged for, the L. of C. and Caledonian pipe bands will furnish lively music during the races, which will commence at 7 o'clock sharp.

In order to keep the course clear and at the same time giving ample room and scope for the spectators, the management has arranged to have the grounds roped off nobody being allowed on the course but officials and the participants.

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BART MADDEN WILL NOT BOX IN JERSEY

Irishman's Manager Raises Another Hurdle Before the Negro Heavyweight.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Another piece of barbed wire has been strung up in the entanglements surrounding the Harry Willis-Bartley Madden match. Charlie Rose, Madden's vest pocket manager, is insisting that the contest must take place in New York. Rose is very insistent on this point and the Queensboro folks can persuade the Fire Department to lift the ban on their neat little bowl in Long Island City, well and good, says Charlie. But if they can't Rose wants the match to be turned over to some other club in New York City. Charlie is balky as a mule over the idea of putting the scrap in Dreamland Park, on the outskirts of Newark. "I will not let the match go to Jersey," says Madden's boss, just as if he means it.

Speaking of the Queensboro Stadium, it is pertinent to note that there was a decidedly optimistic feeling this morning among the persons interested in preserving that area for boxing. Neither Simon-Flaherty nor any one else in an official capacity would say what was in the wind, but they did not deny that they were very hopeful that everything would be straightened out within the next forty-eight hours.

From a reliable source it is learned that several members of the Fire Department spent a couple of hours yesterday afternoon looking over the stadium. Maybe they were just looking for the best spot to start the work of demolition. And then again may be they were there on a more pleasant mission. If the ban is lifted the big battle can be staged next Monday night.

Getting back to Charlie Rose and his stand against transferring the battle to New Jersey, the fact that the match originally was made by the National Sportsman's Club of Newark was called to his attention. But Rose insists that when the Newark outfit turned over the attraction to the Queensboro club the original agreement was voided. If it comes to a showdown there'll be quite an argument over that point.

Rose says the reason he is so dead set against letting the bout go to Jersey is that even if Madden outpointed Willis there would be just a no decision affair. Charlie wants us to believe that he really thinks Bartley can earn the verdict over Harry. Maybe he does think so. Boxing managers get queer notions.

That the fans who made reservations for the Willis Madden fracas still have confidence that the match will be staged is evidenced by the disclosure made at the offices of the Boxing Commission yesterday that not one in twenty of the buyers of seats has asked for a refund. This was learned by representatives of the boxing board on checking up the funds obtained by the club through the advance sale. It is stated that the money thus obtained is amply protected and that there is no reason for the commission to step in.

Incidentally, Chairman George E. Brower of the commission riddled the rumors that one reason—the big one—why the Queensboro club is having so much trouble was that the commission did not want to permit a mixed bout between heavyweights. Chairman Brower stated without reservation that the match was approved by the commission, and judging from the tone of his remarks the commission would like to see the bout held in this State rather than in a neighboring commonwealth.
