Says Fredericton Team Will Retire

FREDERICTON, March 14. — JACK Lawler, manager of the Capitals, of Fredericton, New Brunswick, intermediate hockey champions, has stated that his team will retire content with the provincial title unless the Halifax Wanderers and Charlottetown Victorias play off to decide which team plays off with Fredericton for the Maritime title. The contention is that the Fredericton team, which has traveled nearly 700 miles in playing three home and home series, has been put to a great expense and inconvenience which the other teams have not suffered. The present schedule calls for the Capitals to play at Charlottetown Tuesday next, but the team will not go, according to today's announcement, but will play the winner of a Halifax-Charlottetown series, if there is any ice left.

In connection with the above dispatch, J. F. Connolly, secretary of the New Brunswick, and P. E. Island and intermediate play-offs, announced last night that an endeavor will be made to have Charlottetown and Fredericton meet in a sudden death game at Moncton Wednesday night for the northern championship and the right to meet Nova Scotia in the finals. The constitution of the M. A. H. A. definitely states that New Brunswick and P. E. Island must play off first. Should Charlottetown insist on home and home games, have to comply with the requirements or forfeit their right to take Fredericton seconds will either part in the championship series.
