DEATH OF MRS. WILLIAM WHITE—The death of Mrs. William White took place at her home in Murray Harbor North at the age of 76 years.

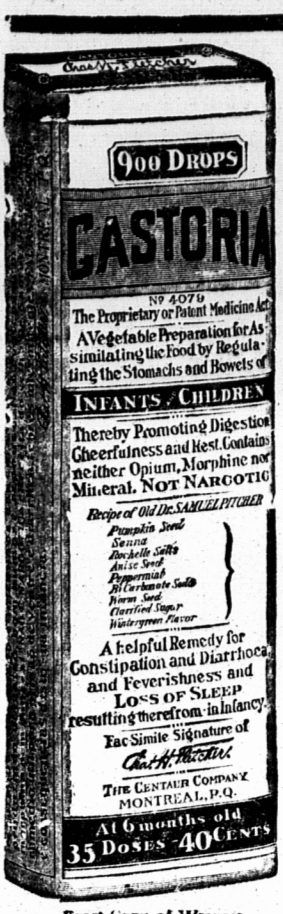
FRIDAY
