"Dear Mrs. Moore: I would be very grateful if you could publish a page of suppers—what to prepare and how to prepare it—something cheap and does not take too long to prepare. We are a family of four adults, and on account of unemployment have very little money coming in."

"I am sure there are hundreds like myself at the present time that would appreciate th's help. There is a lot of wonderful cooking published in your page, and I know one so skilled in the art of cooking could help us poor people out, if you have the time to spare."

"I would like just two courses—meat and vegetables, or fish and vegetables, and a dessert. If I had soup I would not have fish or meat. I would also like a few lunches if it would not be asking too much. Or could I buy a book on cheap dishes? I do hope you will be able to help me out. Sincerely yours, Mrs. A. M. H."

Such a charming letter just made me anxious to be up and trying some of these suppers I have suggested so that is what I did.

Not one little luxury was indulged at our table and we are all enjoying it and have Mrs. A. M. H. to thank.

My little correspondent signing herself: "A Friend" will find that these menus and suggestions will largely fill her need too.

Mrs. A. M. H. has given me one lead to start with—the family evidently like soup.

Before we plunge too deeply into menus I want to give one exhortation: The expensive foods are the lazy foods—they are almost always easily prepared. While it does not follow that inexpensive foods are difficult to prepare, to a certain extent one must be willing to make them attractive in appearance and to fuss up the flavor. I am not asking that you use much more time and energy—but more thought. The

clever cook is not the one who makes delicious meals from expensive food—the honors go to the ingenious cook who can, by flavoring and garnishing make the humblest stew delicious to taste, attractive to look at and nourishing.

Menu For Family of Four. Supper Menu 1

Cream of bean soup; baked squares of Hubbard squash; broiled tomatoes; baked apples.

In planning this meal I figured that ample portions of the soup would prove very filling and nourishing too. All three other items can be cooked in the oven—thus utilizing all its heat while it is hot.

Cream of Bean Soup

Soak one and one-half cups beans over night (you may use Lima, white navy or kidney beans as you prefer), in one quart water. In morning put on to boil with one-half onion sliced finely, a little carrot, and one and one half teaspoon salt, and boil until beans are very tender. Strain through fine sieve To th's strained mixture add one pint or three cups of milk (the amount depending on how thick you like soup) and reheat the whole in top of double boiler. A little but
