EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr. Richard Hunt has been designated substitute U. S. Consul Agent at Summerside.

A son of Sir Henry Joly and a son of Hon. Mr. Dobell, have gone to the war in South Africa.

Sir Louis Davies returned home by the night train of Saturday, looking robust and vigorous after his Atlantic trip. He will receive a warm welcome to his native Island.

Military Orders of Nov 2nd convey to Lieut. Col. Otter, the Governor General's "highest congratulations upon your very soldierly embarkation," with his wishes for the honor and renown of the Corps during the campaign.

Premier Farquharson desires to return thanks through the press for the people of this Province to Sir William C. McDonald for the generous provision he has made to provide manual training in schools.

Late despatches from London indicate that though there is no immediate prospect of intervention by the continental powers, they will, when the war is over, claim compensation in territory nearer home, if Britain annexes the Dutch republics. France is believed to be actively preparing the way for this course of action.

There seems to be so much confidence both in Britain and Canada as to what General Buller will do when he reaches the front that it is just possible some disappointment may follow. There seems to be no doubt that he is an active, energetic commander, who thoroughly knows his business, and is possessed of a resolute will. Probably he never said what is reported of him, that he "expects to eat his Christmas dinner in Pretoria." If he can reach the Transvaal capital as a victor within that time he will certainly achieve great fame. The chances are that his hosts of admirers are just now expecting greater things of him than he or any other man can perform.

The Montreal Witness says:—"No English Protestant Premier has ever proposed to do what Sir Wilfrid Laurier has done for the aid of the empire, though Britain has had more serious wars than this one. Whatever theories Protestants may entertain concerning them, there are countless Roman Catholics who are, in point of fact, as loyal to the British Crown as any Protestant can be, and Great Britain has been able safely to entrust her dearest and largest interests in the hands of such. Sir George Cartier said that the last gun fired for the British connection in Canada should it ever come to that would be fired by a French Canadian. The insinuations by the organs of that political party of which he was so distinguished a leader, that a French-Canadian is likely to be disloyal, and the declaration that a thoroughly loyal Premier is disloyal and cowardly, are the worst sort of treason against a country which is made up of different peoples living happily together under one allegiance.

Pietermaritzburg, the capital of Natal, mentioned in our despatches, is situated 47 miles inland and north-

west of Durban. It is commonly called Maritzburg. The town had a population in 1891 of 17,500 and it is now considerably more. It has not been strongly fortified, and the inhabitants are now in fear that the Boer forces may yet reach them. Colenso, now abandoned to the enemy, is 122 miles by rail north of Pietermaritzburg. An exchange states that the line of approach to the Natal capital is over a mountain road wholly commanded by the largest piece of artillery in South Africa. It is hoped that the town will be occupied by a strong British force before the enemy reaches it. There are now about 3000 British troops there.

She Didn't Recognize Him.

A parson who occasionally preaches in South London arrived to take the place of the vicar, who had been called away on account of some family bereavement, and found an old and rather asthmatic lady straggling up the steps which led to the front door. He courteously gave her his arm to assist her, and when they reached the dame asked him if he knew who was going to preach. "Mr. So-and-So," replied the parson, giving his own name. "Oh, dear me," exclaimed the old lady, "help me down again, if you please! I'd rather listen to the groaning and creaking of a windmill than sit under him," and she prepared to descend. The parson gently assisted her down stairs, and sightfully remarked, as he bade her good-bye, "I wouldn't go in either if I weren't the preacher."—London Daily Telegraph.

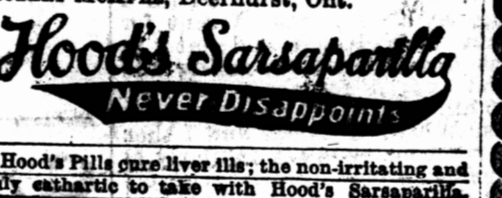

ice boat, and nearly all of the summer yachtsmen are in possession of such a canvas which lie useless all winter.

The ice boat is rigged with the ordinary jib and mainsail rig of the small sloop so common to Charlottetown harbor during the summer, and it would be a small matter to build ice boat hulls to suit the canvas and spar used on the 16 and 18-foot class boat during the season of open winter.

Ice boat races are a great deal more exciting than yacht races; not because of the added danger, but because of the novelty and the speed attained by steel-shod crafts and the ease with which they can be managed.

The construction of an ice boat, too, offers a much larger scope for the exercise of amateur ingenuity than does the construction of small boats to which so many amateurs turn their heads each summer. The familiar sloop rig is not the only sail plain used by yachtsmen. In many places the rigging and canvas, and in fact hull construction are as diversified as those affected in vessels which slip up and down the stream when the thermometer is away above the freezing point. The leg-of-mutton and big sail plans follow the sloop sail plan in popularity, but yawl and mackinaw rigs are not uncommon. In size they range all the way from little craft which spread from 120 to 200 square feet of canvas to those which carry from 700 to 800 square yards.

If Charlottetown is to be up-to-date in sports during the coming winter an ice boat club should be organized at once and an iceboating regatta should be held.

UNCLE SAM WAS FOOLED.

MADRID, Nov. 2.—A sensation was created in the senate yesterday by the declaration of Count D'Almendra that owing to the ignorance of the Spanish-American Peace Treaty Commissioners, three islands of the Philippine group, the two Batanes and Calayan island, both north of Luzon, were not included in the scope of the treaty. These islands, he asserted, ought to be made the basis of negotiations for the liberation of the Spanish prisoners.
