MONTREAL, Aug. 21—(CP)—The Price change structure in transactions on the stock market today was irregular, with ups and downs fairly well split. Trading touched most of the groups in spots. Canada Steamships preferred again distinguished itself, chalking up a new high for an aggregate gain of two points this week. Asbestos, which moved up a point, led a batch of industrials into higher territory, others to pick up gains being Dominion Tar, Sherwin Williams, Hamel and Heating, Decco B, General Steel Wares and Canada Cement. On the downside were Gypsum, International Bridge preferred and Dominion Bronze. Howard Smith was improved in papers but Price Brothers failed to hold an early gain. C.P.R. was fractionally better in rails. Except for Bell Telephone and Montreal Power which advanced, utilities were on the soft side. Shawinigan, Power Corporation, Ottawa Power, International Power preferred and Brazilian all trekked backward. Consolidated Smelters lost a gain in three and Bull's Hollinger and Noranda were always behind. Lake of the Woods, Alberta Grain

Toro.to Exchange

TORONTO, Aug. 21—(CP)—The gold and industrial stocks turned a bit heavy in the final half-hour today on the Toronto exchange. New high prices for the year were recorded by Alberta Pacific Grain, Western Flour and the Maple issues. Alberta Pacific advanced 7 points to 32 and the common was up 26 cents to 1.25. Maple Leaf common traded 3,000 shares and firm 1-4 to 3-4 and the preferred closed 5-8 up at 6 3/4. The Galtineau issues rose 3-8 to 3-4, banks were higher and other industrial groups unchanged. Home Oil traded in substantial volume on a rise of 7 cents to 2 3/8 and smaller gains were held by Calgary and Edmonton and Okalta while Dalhousie and Foothills were narrowly weaker. Royaltie weakened 1-2 to 24. Duquesne traded 37,000 shares and firm 1-2 to 11 1/4. Murphy and Robb-Montbray were active at slightly weaker prices. Anar, Chesler, Kirkland Lake, Malaric Gold Fields and Mining Corporation were up narrowly while mild weakness was shown by Pickle Crow, Wright-Hargreaves, Preston and San Antonio. Noranda and Nickel had small gains at the close and in the cheap-end group, Ventures, Waite-Amulet and Pend Oreille posted slightly better prices while Falconbridge and Sleep Rock weakened 3 to 5 cents.

Lots with sharp-pointed corners waste land because the resulting wedge-shaped areas have little or no utility, it is pointed out by land-planning experts. Such lots also constitute poor building sites. Sharp-angled lots can be avoided by planning streets to intersect at right angles and by making side-lot lines perpendicular or radial to street lines. When minor streets join a thoroughfare at sharp angles, visibility is greatly impaired for both motorists and pedestrians.
