WATCH THE CHILDREN'S TEETH.

Toothache is the cause of forty per cent of all absences from school attendance, and the child absentee has not only to bear the toothache, but becomes discouraged at his lack of progress, and seizes the first excuse for leaving school and swelling the ranks of unskilled workers.

Between the sixth and twelfth years—those golden years of watchful shining morning face—teeth are most helpless and dependent, says Dr. Edwin F. Bowers. During this period the first teeth are lost, their loss being accompanied by considerable decay, the permanent teeth means while coming in. Tooth nutrition is interfered with by the pressure of the second tooth pushing upward. In addition to all this misery, the poisonous germs from diseased lower teeth, making him more susceptible to infectious diseases. This is one of the chief reasons why the children of the poor succumb more rapidly to these diseases than the children of wealthier families. The poorer parents have no knowledge of dental prophylaxis, nor money to pay for the same if they had. Consequently disease germs find ready entrance into these unclean mouths, and establish most favorable grounds for growth and propagation.

The first of the permanent teeth, the six-year molar, is by far the most important tooth we have, or have had; for when it is lost, nature, in her bungling way, makes a determined effort to close the vacant space by foreshortening the jaw. This throws the entire articulation "out of joint," and is the chief cause of irregularities in the other and later teeth.

Science is now emphasizing the importance of teeth in preparing food for digestion. It is also calling attention to the very intimate connection between decayed teeth and a large number of diseases that apparently have nothing to do with teeth. A little reflection serves to show that improperly masticated food due to bad teeth, or lack of teeth, is a primary cause of malnutrition, resulting in anemia, neurasthenia, and the entire pernicious host of symptoms that follow chronic indigestion and auto-intoxication from intestinal absorption.

Preventive dentistry has added not only to the length of life, but also to its breadth and depth, measured in terms of efficiency and happiness. Scientific dentists all over the world now believe that at least 80 per cent of all dental troubles can be prevented by proper caring for the teeth from infancy to old age.

RISE IN SUGAR WILL NOT AFFECT MARITIME CITIES

(Moncton Transcript)

Mention was made in yesterday's issue of the general scarcity of granulated sugar in all retail stores of the city and a twenty-five cent increase per hundred weight was reported on granulated sugar yesterday morning. A wholesale dealer speaking to The Transcript this morning explained that the raise quoted, would not necessarily affect the maritime sections. This he explained as follows: Four refineries are listed in record, these being The Canada, and Saint Lawrence refineries of Montreal; the Acadia of Halifax, and the Atlantic refinery at St. John N. B. Yesterday's raise was that quoted on the Canada Refinery in Montreal, the others remained in former lists, with the exception of the one Montreal refinery noted above. Obviously the raise would affect the particular localities in the near proximity of Montreal, but would not reach the maritime cities, as they were governed by the quotations of the Acadia and Atlantic refineries, and these in turn are governed, so it is reported, by the Board of Commerce. Wholesalers could not authorize any jump in price unless the refinery quotation from which they purchased their stock of sugar listed a higher price, and they were so notified. The maritime refineries have not listed any higher price in sugar, so consumers may for a time be satisfied in the belief that sugar will not go up in price in the Maritime Provinces.

Relative to the general scarcity, as reported, the official stated such report was true, and granulated sugar was very scarce at the present time. Such scarcity will be felt until the last of November when the market will brighten again. Yellow sugar is very plentiful and can be easily obtained from retailers.

FATHER O'DONNELL MUST FACE THE COURT MARTIAL

DUBLIN, Oct. 26.—The King's Bench today refused a writ of habeas corpus to Father O'Donnell, the Tasmanian chaplain who was arrested October 18th and confined in Richmond Barracks.

Father O'Donnell's petitions averred he was imprisoned illegally because no charge was formulated. The crown charged that the chaplain was guilty of treasonous and disloyal language at Killarney, and that being subject to military control, he will be turned over to the Australian military authorities for court martial.

After approximately \$34,000 had been deducted for funeral expenses, counsel fees and debts, the entire estate will go to the widow of the former President in trust to be distributed among their children in any proportion she may determine.
