LONDON LETTER

 LONDON, March 5.—(CP)—An English family named the latest addition to the flock "John Uno" to commemorate the assembly of the United Nations here, and for the once infantile "Mafeking" lions dear to the British press. The "Times" of London devoted an editorial to "the great lottery of the fount," remarking that "many people are christened in haste to 'spout at leisure' and predicting the eventual naming of a little Miss Untra."

"Yet it may be doubted whether any of them will be grateful, and boys are less offensive than they were to whom, as demonstrated by the Countess of Wemyss and March, a rather crude sense of humor, is much to be said for the strictly ordinary."

People with odd names can, however, sometimes find humor in the situation, as demonstrated by Grace, Countess of Wemyss and March, "the most beloved and most bewitching of women." She died in London recently.
Lady Wemyss (pronounced Weems) drew gaily fantastic sketches for the family young fry. One showed a retinue of nightmarish animals marching to a nightmarish zoo and beneath she wrote this verse:
