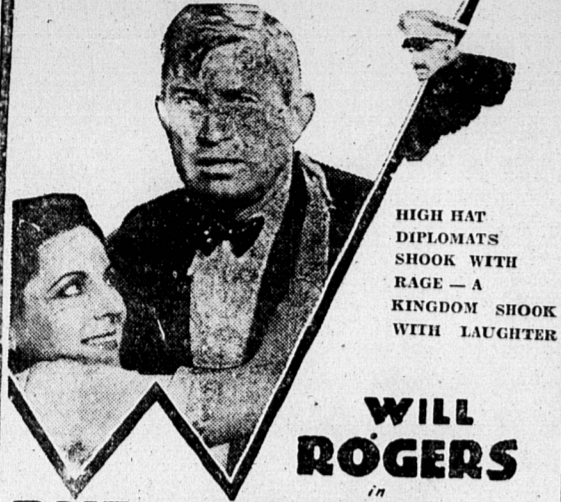

Light, Market And Tender Committee Reports

The following reports in addition to those published in yesterday's Guardian, were submitted at the annual meeting of the City Council on Monday night:

LIGHT COMMITTEE

On behalf of the Light Committee the chairman Councillor Walter E. Burke reported that during the past year twenty different sections of the city had been visited, and the committee found that a number of these places should be better lighted. They made several changes in some of these sections by increasing several lamps to a higher candle power, and this was done without extra expense to the city. While investigating different sections of the city they found that the trees have grown so large that during the summer months the lights are of very little value. The committee recommended that in the near future a number of these lights be changed or it will be necessary to cut down some of the trees.

During the past year, the Maritime Electric Company have made a wonderful change in the improvement of the plant. They have spent about \$180,000 in erecting a new building and new equipment, and are now in a position to give our citizens first-class service. No doubt when a new contract will be submitted to the city, they will give cheaper rates. The chairman of the Light Committee had investigated the places of a number of the city's largest electric consumers, and had placed the matter before Mr. Coleman and Mr. Golman, both of whom assured the committee chairman that they would give this important matter their immediate consideration, that they would consider some arrangement that would be satisfactory and that cheaper rates would be arranged.

The Light Committee had received a letter from the Superintendent of the Canadian National Railways, asking if the Council would consider the placing of some lights around the Canadian National Hotel. At the last regular Council meeting the City Clerk was asked to notify the Superintendent that this matter would be attended to in the early

spring. The placing of a few lights around this beautiful hotel would be a wonderful improvement in that section of the city.

During the committee's term of office they have noticed that with very little extra expense the lighting in the city could be wonderfully improved, and would recommend that the new Council consider this important branch of city work, and at their earliest opportunity.

The committee could have spent a considerable amount of money by the placing of a number of new lights in different parts of the city, but on account of the financial situation they did not press the matter. They hope, however, that in the near future conditions more favorable will permit the carrying out of this important work.

In conclusion Councillor Burke thanked personally the Mayor for his kindness and consideration at all times, and the members of the Council for their loyal support and co-operation.

MARKET COMMITTEE

The market committee report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1931, submitted by the chairman, Councillor James E. Blanchard, showed the following receipts: Market tolls, \$3740; rents, \$1,120.30; weigh scales, \$303.44, a total of \$5,663.81, representing an increase of over \$325 over 1930, this amount being made by the sale of four extra stalls which were vacant in 1930.

During the year a new office was built for the Federal Government Egg Inspector at no cost to the city. Since this has been in operation quite an improvement has been noticed in the class of eggs that are sold. It is also a great help to the women who are selling the eggs. Previously they could not tell whether the eggs were fresh or not.

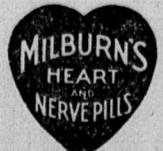
The weigh scales did about the same business as in previous years. The buildings are in good repair with the exception of the roof over the Board of Trade room, this requires a new covering of tar.

The basement containing the bowling alleys has been kept in good sanitary condition, due chiefly to the capable man who is in charge.

The Fish Department requires a few dra n pipes. Councillor Blanchard strongly recommended that the centre slab be removed and the tables placed around the walls, thus avoiding blocking at the doorway.

LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS. Extensive repair work is being carried on in connection with the Electric system at Montague. Many improvements are being made, new inventions have come to the fore, and are now taking the place of those which, but a few years ago, were quite up-to-date. Five men,

under the very efficient leadership of Mr. Robert K. Clements, electrical expert, have been working on the line for some weeks, rehabilitating the distributing system. Installation of four spool racks in place of the secondary wood cross arm.
