SEE PROPAGANDA PICTURE. A large crowd of citizens attended an interesting motion picture in the Empire Theatre yesterday afternoon. The film, which was an intercepted German one, showed the advance of Hitler's hordes into Poland and the subsequent capture of Warsaw. It was propaganda prepared by the Germans. It is believed the film was enroute to Norway where the Huns intended showing it to the people there. STARCH FACTORIES CLOSE—A total of 225,000 bushels of potatoes were converted this autumn into tons of starch in the four Prince Edward Island factories devoted to that work. The processing was completed at Murray Harbor, St. Peter's and Baltic factories last week and at Hunter River, operations will close this Wednesday. Farmers received an average of 45 cents a hundred pounds for their partially blighted potatoes, which would have gone to waste, from the proprietors of these factories. This year's number of potatoes processed was only 50 per cent of last season which is a fair indication of the decrease in the potato crop over 1940. The starch will be shipped to be used in the textile and adhesive trades.

SLIGHTLY INJURED IN COLLISION—Snow, turned into an icy surface by heavy traffic on city streets, caused motorists considerable trouble over the weekend and the sight of automobiles stranded against the curb was common. The same was true on the paved highways in the country districts and everywhere cars headed for the ditch because of icy spots on the road. Island Airman (Continued from page 1) the wrist. Willie suffered thigh wounds from shell splinters. The gunner drove off the enemy with three damaging bursts as the Hudson plunged toward the sea. Willie managed to level off, however, when the plane was so close to the water that the wireless operator was preparing the dinghy for the crew. The captain asked the operator for the course home before he revealed he was wounded. MacLeod was placed on an opened parachute for a short time and first aid was administered. Then he joined Willie in the cockpit. The plane struggled along on a single motor. The damaged engine picked up a bit and the flames died. While he headed for England, MacLeod's pain became so intense that the crew had to carry him to his bunk at the rear of the Hudson. The wireless operator sent a message asking for an ambulance to stand by. When Willie was over the base he discovered that the Hudson's undercarriage was damaged and only one wheel, "wobbling in the breeze" would go down. This wheel collapsed as soon as the plane touched the ground. The Hudson slid on its belly and stopped without further injuring the airman. MacLeod and Willie now are recovering side by side at a hospital.
