A BIDDING ADVANTAGE LOST IN THE PLAY

South in today's deal, deserved credit for an excellent sacrifice bid, but he came out with a very bad score because he lost a trick in the play.

South dealer East-West vulnerable

This deal occurred in a match-point tournament, and the bidding at one table proceeded:

South was eminently right, as it happened, in guessing that the enemy could easily make three notrump, and in feeling that he could afford to go down quite a few tricks and still show a profit. As a matter of fact, East could have made at least four notrump, worth 630 points, and so South could pay a penalty of three tricks, 500 points, and earn an excellent match-point score. Unfortunately, however, he went down 700!

West opened a heart and South let East win the trick. East cashed his three trumps and played another heart. South won, laid down the spade ace and led another spade. West took the trick and led a third round of hearts. South soon found that he could not establish his long spades, and the upshot was that he took only one top spade, one heart, a heart ruff in dummy and and two of his own diamonds, which left him four tricks short of the contract.

Observe what an important difference it would have made if South, after getting on lead with the heart ace, had led a low spade from his hand! West might as well put up the spade queen and play another heart. Dummy would ruff, and now the remaining spade would be led from dummy through East's king-jack-seven. If he failed to "split his honors," South's correct play would be simply to put in the nine-spot; the South would cash the ace and give East a spade trick, setting up his own fifth card in the suit. The same result would come about if East covered dummy's spade eight with the jack.

A mere 500-point penalty would have given North-South, a high standing on the board.
