FLYERS STILL IN RUNNING FOR ALLAN CUP

'PLAY BALL' ECHOES IN MAJOR LEAGUE PARKS

Dean Trade And Other Factors Stir Interest In General Baseball Openings

NEW YORK, April 18—Major league baseball's big push, launched today in only two American League sectors, extends to all fronts tomorrow with box-office records in prospect for club-owners and the answers to two big question marks, Joe DiMaggio and Dizzy Dean, agitating the millions of baseball fans.

Nearly 150,000 fans are expected to witness the six remaining opening games, including a full National League slate in New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and St. Louis. Including the patriots' day double-header, featuring the world champion Yankees and Red Sox in Boston, as well as the continuation of play in Washington, more than 200,000 spectators may witness the day's aggregate proceedings.

Red Sox And Senators Win Initial Tilts

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
BOSTON, April 18—The ancient baseball theory, that the son of one of his stars is never brilliant, was upset today, along with New York Yankees, when Jim Bagby, Jr., 21 year old offspring of Cleveland world series pitching hero, made his major league debut by turning back the world champion, 8-4, before an opening day crowd of 10,530.

Bagby called upon to pitch in the first regularly scheduled American League game he ever attended worked only six innings, but he was credited with the victory, the score being tied 4-4 when he retired for a pinch-hitter while his teammates were driving Red Sox from the Yankee starter, from the mound.

CRONIN STARTS RALLY

The Soxers were trailing 4-2 in the sixth when Manager Joe Cronin started a furious uprising with a single. Before the side could be routed by fireballing Joe Vance, the Soxers had clinched matters by driving in six runs on five hits, three passes and a sacrifice, after sending 11 batters to the plate.

Ruffing bore the brunt of that rally and when he departed, the home forces, who had defied baseball tradition by opening the campaign with a rookie pitcher, had a 7-4 lead and the game, played between showers that caused a 10-minute halt, safe in hand.

Angely opened by fanning lead-off Frankie Crosetti and forced four more Yanks to whiff before he gave way to Leo Nonnenkamp who won the game, tied, two on and one out in the big Boston inning. Jim, Jr., issued six passes but about half of them were ordered by Cronin.

WILD HITTING GAME

WASHINGTON, April 18—Washington Senators gave the President what he asked for today—a wild-hitting baseball game—beating Philadelphia Athletics 12-8 in a season opener before 29,000 fans.

Before Mr. Roosevelt was a third through his first bag of peanuts, Washington scored four runs, jumping on the veteran Harry Kelley for four hits in the first inning.

Philadelphia then gave Washington's Wesley Ferrell the same treatment in the third, whacking Johnson—for four runs.

Dimaggio Still Determined To Holdout

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 18—(AP)—Joe DiMaggio, holdout outfielder of New York Yankees, stood pat today on his demand for more than \$25,000 while his club took an opening day beating from Boston Red Sox.

"Of the Yankees' defeat, he said: 'Gee, that's too bad.' It cost DiMaggio \$162 in salary to be absent for the season's opener but he gave no indications of concern about it.

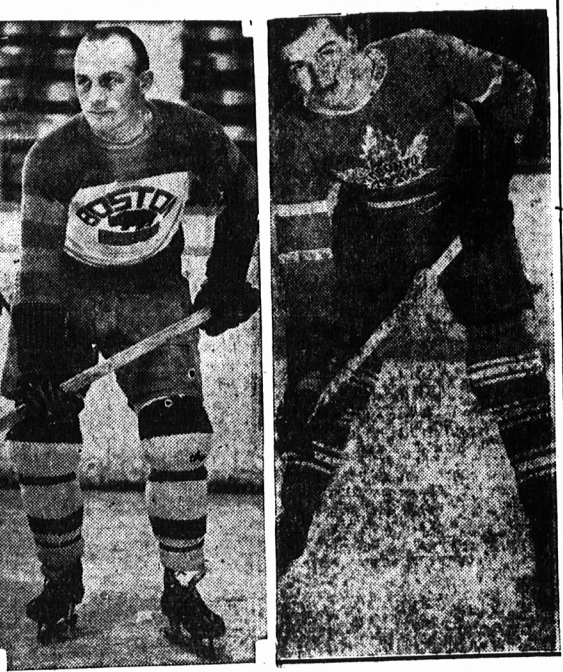

Shore And Drillon Share Hockey Honors

Most Valuable
MONTRÉAL, April 18—(CP)—Aging Eddie Shore of Boston Bruins, one of the National Hockey League's all-time greats, was awarded the Hart Trophy today as the most valuable player to his club during the 1937-38 season.

At the same time league president Frank Calder announced Gordon Drillon, Toronto's ace right winger, as winner of the Lady Byng Trophy as the "most gentlemanly" player.

OUTSTANDING FIGURE

Shore, 35, was the sparkplug of the ponderous Boston defence through the Brin drive to the sectional championship with 30 victories and only 11 defeats. In the playoffs for the League championship, when Boston fell three times to Toronto Maple Leafs, Shore was an outstanding figure in defeat.

Drillon, also a "CP" all-star, was adjudged the player best combining technical ability with highest qualities of sportsmanship in his second big-league year. He won with 52 points, half of them through goals, and led all scorers in the playoffs as well.

Both awards were made in a pool of hockey writers around the circuit. Drillon, who had only two minor penalties all season, was chosen ahead of Clint Smith and Cecil Dillon, both of New York Rangers, and Syl Apps, centre of the line on which Drillon is right wing.

Thompson Runner-up

Paul Thompson, left wing of Chicago's Stanley Cup champions, was runner-up to Shore for the Dr. David A. Hart trophy with Babe Siebert, Montreal Canadian defenceman, third in the voting. Siebert and Shore were Boston's first-string defence for several seasons before the former was traded to Canadians.

Able Filled Berth

Drafted in the midst of the 1936-37 rebuilding of Leafs, after Charlie Conacher was injured, Drillon filled in perfectly on a line with Apps and Harvey Jackson. He came up from Syracuse Stars of the International-American League and got 33 points in his first crack at the major league level.

Johnny Kelly Favorite To Win Marathon Today

BOSTON, April 18—A poll of 20 New England sport writers tonight established Gerard Cote of Ste. Hyacinthe, Que., as second favorite to win the Boston Athletic Association's annual Hopkinton-Boston marathon tomorrow. The favorite is Johnny Kelly of Arlington, Mass., who won in 1935.

Cote, winner of seventh place here for a month, is one of 38 Canadians entered.

Showers are predicted for tomorrow with the temperature expected to be in the low 70's—a boon to Canadian runners who generally make a better showing if the temperature is not too high. The race starts at noon and is over a 26-mile 38-yard course.

Duncan McCallum, Toronto entry who came fifth last year, was picked to finish first in the 1938 classic by Jerry Nasson, Boston Globe writer. Patrick J. Kelly, St. John's, Nfld. star and five times 10-mile champion of Newfoundland, is another with a high rating as is Tony Longman, Toronto, sixth in the recent British Empire Games marathon in Sydney, Australia.

Among the late entries was Dave Komonen of Sudbury, Ont., who won the Boston classic in 1934 but who has finished only once since. Six former winners will compete today—led by Clarence DeMar, Greenfield, Conn., who won the first of his seven Boston marathon titles in 1911 and last in 1930. Others are Bill Kennedy, Greenfield, Conn., who won in 1917; Leslie Paterson, Pawtucket, R. I. (1933); Dave Komonen, Sudbury, Ont., (1934); Johnny Kelly,
