JOHN O'CONNELL

Funeral services for Mr. John O'Connell of 13 Hillside park, Somerville, Mass who celebrated his 90th birthday on Feb. 3, will be held tomorrow morning in St. Joseph's Church and the burial will be in Calvary Cemetery, Waltham.

The daughters are Mrs. Mary M. Harrington of West Somerville and Mrs. Rose A. Farrell, with whom Mr. O'Connell made his home.

Conference as Solution

(Canadian Press) ST. JOHN, N. B., Mar. 17.—Canadian problems should be solved by conference rather than by debate, A. O. Dawson, former President of the Montreal Board of Trade, told a gathering of 350 representatives business and professional men at the Saint John Board of Trade banquet in a local hotel here tonight.

Mr. Dawson said that confederation had been consummated by the efforts of conscientious men gathered in conference and that if the leaders of the country would forget party politics and get together in discussion, solutions could be found from present day difficulties. Mr. Dawson reviewed the transportation, agriculture financial and business situation, and said that in Canada alone of all countries in the world, had the per capita income risen since the outbreak of the war. He warned his audience that attempts were being made to induce Maritime districts to change their location to the upper provinces and that some communities were offering immunity of taxes over long periods of years.

Lieutenant Colonel A. E. Massie, vice-President of the Board of Trade, presided and introduced the speakers. Mr. Dawson was seated at his right and Hon. W. E. Foster at his left. Other guests of honor included: John Scott, Managing Editor of the Montreal Gazette; J. F. B. Livesay of Toronto; General Manager of the Canadian Press; A. W. Robb of Drummond; J. D. McKenna, T. F. Drummond and W. E. Yetman. Mr. McKenna was the first speaker. He paid a tribute to Mr. Dawson for his support of Maritime rights and spoke of the progress made by the provinces in the campaign for the recognition of their problems. Other speakers included: A. J. Foster, Mr. Livesay, Mr. Robb, Mr. McKenna, Mr. Belding and Hon. Dr. Foster.

American Wheat Shipped Through Canadian Port

(Special to the Guardian) MONTREAL, March 16.—The tramp steamer "Acquittania" which is clearing from East Saint John today will carry 245,000 bushels of wheat. This wheat was secured from Buffalo for Saint John through the efforts of the foreign freight department of the Canadian National Railways and it is the largest movement of American wheat to be shipped through a Canadian port in some time.
