INDIAN DEAD—There passed away on Wednesday at 12 o'clock noon Feb. 6th, Mr. Francis Thomas Bonville in his native parish, Burnt Church, in the residence of his sister. He was commonly known on P. E. Island as little Frank Thomas, born at Tracadie N. B. on Aug. 15th, 1875. He came to Lennox Island when a young lad and shortly after his arrival he married Ann Matilda Francis, an amiable daughter of the first teacher of Lennox Island, late Martin Francis. His wife predeceased him 12 years ago. Mr. Bonville was one of the healthiest Indians that ever lived but the dreaded disease, pneumonia, overpowered him after an illness of three days. Mr. Bonville was a hard worker, working in the lumber woods, stream-driving, in the harvest fields of the Canadian North West on the Oyster, Cod, Lobster, Mackerel and salmon fishing grounds. He was an expert shot and shot large quantities of wild fowl and trapper of all kinds of fur-bearing animals. He was also a servant of the Hon. Senator Yeo, Wm. John and James Richards for a good many years. He had a great horror of all kinds of intoxicating liquors, was a temperance worker, treasurer and trustee of the church for a good many years. A devoted husband and father, a kind and dutiful friend to all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Mr. Michael Thomas, runner, is the only surviving son to mourn the loss of his dear father.
