MONTRÉAL EXCHANGE

MONTRÉAL, Oct. 24—Forced selling during which block after block of stock was thrown on the market by brokers, who could no longer hold it for clients, when additional margin was not forthcoming today, threw Montreal Stock Exchange into a near panic.

ADD WALL STREET

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 24—The remarkable area of avid public speculation in stocks, which has swept over the country during the past five years, came to a climax today in the most terrifying stampede of selling ever experienced on the New York Stock Exchange and other leading security markets.

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SUGGESTS GOVERNMENT CO-OPERATION

How Canada Is Mapped From Air

In compiling maps in the Topographical Survey of the Department of the Interior by aerial photographic methods, two types of photographs are employed, namely, the vertical and the oblique. The oblique photograph may be used for plotting maps to a scale of four miles to an inch or to smaller scales for areas such as exist in parts of northern Canada where the topographical detail lies practically upon the same plane.

MARITIME CONFERENCE DEC. 20.

It was announced that the meeting of the Maritime senators and business men will take place in Charlottetown about November 20. Disapproval was expressed on the choice of the date as the Royal Winter Fair is also scheduled to begin on that date.

VACCINATION CAMPAIGN

A Vaccination campaign is being conducted by the Red Cross Society during which the local doctors assisted by the Red Cross Nurses expect to visit every rural school in the province this fall for the purpose of vaccinating the children. The percentage of unvaccinated children attending the country schools is alarmingly high above 85 per cent.

THREE IN CREW

Three men generally comprise the crew of a party engaged in taking aerial photographs: the navigator, the pilot and the camera operator. The navigator is an officer of the Topographical Survey, and the other members of the crew are members of the staff of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

DRIFT CORRECTED

When the wind is sufficiently strong from either side to influence the direction of the craft, it will "drift" to the right or left of the theoretical straight line which the plane is endeavoring to follow. In order to overcome the drift, the craft is nosed gently into the wind until the plane is observed to follow the desired route as projected on the ground.

AN ELECTRICAL DEVICE, WHILE FOR OBLIQUE WORK

An electrical device, while for oblique work, the operation of the camera is by hand, and the pictures are taken in sets of three at intervals of from one to two miles. A camera is supplied with six magazines, each containing one roll of panchromatic hypersensitized film, capable of taking from one hundred and five to one hundred and ten pictures of size 7 by 9 inches.

JAMES MACRAE

GLACE BAY, Oct. 24—John A. MacRae, Glace Bay business man, was notified this evening by telegram, that his brother, James MacRae, of Outlook, Sask., died this morning, following injuries received in a train accident. The telegram contained no further particulars other than he had been injured last night and passed away this morning. It is presumed that his motor car must have been struck by a locomotive.

The deceased was a native of Prince Edward Island but for many years had been a resident of the Canadian west, where he made a big success of ranching. He was 45 years of age and unmarried. He is survived by five brothers—John A. and Hazard, of Glace Bay; Wendell, Daniel, and David, in the west; also two sisters—Mrs. Thompson, in the west, and Mrs. Smith, of Halifax. The remains will be taken to P. E. I. for burial.
