lary system based upon a managed
paper standard.

"If England can find billions of
dollars for social betterment,
for housing and reconstruction of cit-
ies, why would she not find the
means to speak of unlimited millions for
peace and world peace, we in
Canada—the third largest agri-
cultural producing country in the world—
should be able to finance a national
highway programme and a national
tourist policy that will permit
us to sell the inexhaustible
supply of tourist merchandise that
we have to offer from coast to
coast.

Delighted With Maritimes

"I have been tremendously im-
pressed," Mr. McGeer declared,
"with the attractiveness of New
Brunswick and Prince Edward Is-
land. This section of the Domi-
on of Canada is really a summer
island of Eden, and some day its sum-
mer charm—in fact the summer
charm of all the Maritime Provin-
ces—will bring about the prediction
of Sir William Van Horne who once
declared that the Maritime Provin-
ces would eventually become the
summer playground for the peo-
ple of the United States.

"I am making this trip through
the Maritimes very largely to con-
firm the first hand the conviction
that I have that Canada's tourist
trade is something that every sec-
tion of Canada can unite upon."

Mr. McGeer interrupted himself
to ask: "Do you know that the
people of the United States own
and operate twenty-eight million
automobiles? Think of that in com-
parison with the people of Ger-
many, France and England who
between them have only 4,600,000
automobiles. The travelling power
of our southern neighbors is six
times as great as the three lead-
ing nations of Europe, and they
are right at our door!"

Canada's Role

"But more important than the
commercial value of the tourist
trade is the fact that the greater
the number of Americans travel-
ling in Canada, and the greater
the number of Canadians who are
travelling in the United States, the
greater is the assurance that Can-
ada can play a real part in cement-
ing the friendship of the French
and English speaking races."

"We are gratified to realize that
no immense hope or relief from
our heavy tax burden can be ex-
pected from the Federal government,
as the budget lately submitted re-
veals, and that no encouragement
or hope can be given farm produc-
ers to sell their farm produce at
more advantageous prices."

"And further, we do heartily con-
gratulate Honourable Roger James
on his election to the high
office of leader of the National
Conservative Party of Canada. His
long experience in public life, his
great talents of leadership and his
natural ability to appreciate the
constituent elements of our com-
plex national life eminently fits him
as a great leader of a great party.
We hereby pledge ourselves to
stand loyally behind him in the
carry-out of the platform of the
National Conservative party."

"I know the objection to dicta-
torship that many orthodox lin-

establish her strength and power

"The greatest danger that democ-
racy faces is that of the prolifera-
tion of dictatorships of Russia, and
the Fascist dictatorships of Germany
and Italy," Mr. McGeer said, "and
democracy is going to survive it
must be able to give to the people
at large as much as, and more than,
the dictatorships are offering."

East Prince Association of the
National Conservative Party at
its annual meeting held in the town hall,
Summerside, on Saturday night.

ing remarks referred to the spe-
