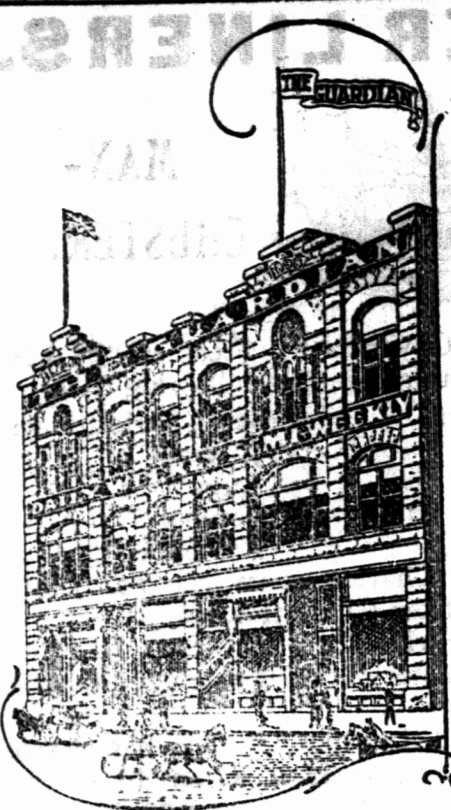

**EXHIBITIONS.**

There is no work in this Province to-day, which is demanding well-trained, well-equipped men as are stock-raising, fruit-growing and agriculture generally. There are few pursuits that to-day present wider and more varied fields for work than does horticulture. We might start at the bottom and show from the soil right up to the finished fruit and its preparation for market and its marketing, that there is a demand upon the men who are engaged in horticulture for a higher class of brains, of skill and industry than is demanded to-day by almost any other work that is being carried on in this Province.

If the above be true every encouragement, every assistance should be given to our people, the vast majority of whom are engaged in these pursuits. The Governments, both Dominion and Local realize these facts and are giving such encouragement as they can to enable our people to progress along these lines, the good results of which are being seen every year.

The lectures delivered by men well versed in their subjects, the Farmers' Institutes established throughout the Province, the men being sent around to different orchards in various sections of the Province to teach our people how to

spray their trees and what spraying is for, enabling our farmers and orchardists to grow the best crops and fruits possible. These means place them in close touch with the more advanced and larger Provinces of Canada, and the best education in these matters in the world to-day.

All these are good and valuable but there is one thing more necessary and that has been provided this year by our Local Government, namely an Exhibition where samples of the stock, agricultural and horticultural products of the Provinces will be brought together in competition and the producers will be able to see where they are as regards the quality of the products which they have been able to produce in comparison with those produced by their brother farmers of this Island as well as those produced by the farmers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. So great is the good thought to be derived from these Exhibitions that the Dominion Government is sending to the three Exhibitions to be held this Autumn in the Maritime Provinces, F. W. Hodgson, the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, who, as will be seen by the Exhibition Prize List, is to have an office on the Exhibition grounds, and will be either there or in the show ring continuously to answer questions, giving encouragement and assistance to our farmers.

Mr. Hodgson is so well and so favorably known to our people that it is not necessary for us to speak in his praise. We may say, however, that the fact of his attending the Exhibition and desiring to have a room placed at his disposal, shows most conclusively that, busy man as he is, he must think Exhibitions are very valuable to our people or he would not occupy his time in attending the different shows.

Shall we rise to the occasion? Will our people show by exhibiting and their attendance at the Exhibition this Autumn that they appreciate the good that has been done for their benefit and that they are only too ready to avail themselves of every means which can possibly be brought within their reach, to enable them in every way to improve their condition? We feel confident that they will show by their exhibiting, attending and interest at the Exhibition this year that they do so. Let it be an Exhibition never to be forgotten. It will be the second of its kind ever held on the Island and let us all try to make it such a success and to show how necessary it is, that one shall have to be held every year. This is all that is required. If our people desire it as an Exhibition must be held. We feel confident they do desire it and in no way can they show that desire so well as by exhibiting and attending.

The New York Tribune discusses the proposed union of Canada and Newfoundland with great intelligence and fairness and concludes that such union would be decidedly to the advantage of both the contracting parties; that it would be in the interest of the British Empire, would simplify the Atlantic fisheries question, and ought to be brought about.

The Manitoba Department of Agriculture is taking elaborate pains to find out how many harvest hands will be required for cutting, stacking and threshing the grain. Better arrangements will also be made this year than before to direct the men to where their services are required. The wheat is now heading out nicely, but the harvest will be some days later than last year. Very shortly we shall have the announcement of excursion rates and the number of men that will be needed.

Scientists say that if every known species of living creatures on earth were to take their places in a line, the smallest at one end and the largest at the other end, the one which would have as many degrees of size above it as below it would be the common house fly. Yet, who ever before thought of the fly as being of the average size of living creatures?

The value of taxable property in Montreal has grown from 30 millions in 1868 to over 150 millions in 1901. Nearly 80 millions of this increase has been added since 1880 and 48 millions since 1890. In the period since 1868 Montreal's debt has also increased from a little over five to 28 millions. The increase of the debt per head of the population has been from \$47 to \$100. The annual revenue of the city is now about \$3,500,000. The properties exempted from taxation have increased in value since 1888 from six millions to 38 millions.

The great port of London is awakening to the fact that if it will hold its large shipping trade more modern improvements in its facilities must be made. A royal commission has had the matter under consideration, and has reported that the Thames channel needs extensive improvement and that the docks are out of date. An expenditure of \$35,000,000 is recommended, \$12,500,000 of which is needed to deepen the channel and \$22,500,000 to provide suitable docks. The money will not be appropriated by the national Government, but must be provided by London itself.
