IN MEMORIAM

JOHN A. STERNS

On Thursday, April 6th, 1933, there passed away at his late residence 234 Richmond St., Charlottetown, John A. Sterns, son of the late Robert Douglas Sterns of Morcell, and Anna M. Hyde, formerly of Cornwall. He leaves to mourn, his wife, nee Florence A. Squarebriggs, daughter of the late Capt. Henry Squarebriggs and an only daughter Ruth, at home.

John A. Sterns was born on Feb. 5, 1871, at Morcell, where his father was the successful proprietor of a carriage manufacturing shop. His years of manhood were given to the business world, first with his uncle Mr. Charles Sterns, Souris, and later as manager of the branch store of the firm of Matthew and McLean at Bridgetown. There he labored for twenty-three years to the complete satisfaction of employers and customers. It was those years of painstaking and persistent application to work that determined his health and brought him to his grave at the comparatively early age of sixty-two.

Of his dealings with his fellow-men none but the very finest things have ever been on the lips of all. He trusted men, and men responded to that trust. He helped them in their difficulties and not loss, but gain, was the result. All in all he was a faithful steward and the work prospered in his hands. He is gone but his memory will linger long with a multitude of men and women.

Besides his widow and daughter there mourn his departure two brothers and a sister, all in the U. S. A., viz: Gordon and Mary in Massachusetts, and William in California.

The funeral was held Monday April 10th, at 1:30 p.m. from his late residence to the People's Cemetery, Rev. C. N. Brown conducted the service at the house, assisted by Rev. J. M. McLeod, Rev. Dr. Ramsay and Rev. W. E. Aitken.
