A CERTIORARI.—Patrick Dogherly, proprietor of the Hotel Davies, who was yesterday convicted of an infraction of the Prohibitory Act has taken the matter to the Supreme Court. A rule for a certiorari was issued yesterday afternoon and served on the Stipendiary Magistrate. The warrant of commitment was consequently returned not executed.

THE Moncton Transcript says:—Mr. J. J. McGee, clerk of the Privy Council, passed through for Ottawa on the Maritime express last night. Mr. McGee has been present at the swearing in of about sixty privy Counsellors. He was returning from Halifax where he swore in the Chief Justice of Nova Scotia and Lieutenant Governor as members of the Privy Council.

REPORTS from nearly all parts of the province (west of Alberton excepted) indicate a large hay crop and about all gathered in excellent condition. The grain is looking well and while the straw will be short of growth in many places, everything points to a good harvest, especially in wheat. Potatoes are good, turnips and other roots it is thought will not be up to the average but no shortage need be anticipated.

A New York despatch of yesterday's date says Elizabeth McCormack, 25 years old, is at the German Hospital. Traces of arsenic poisoning have been discovered. She was out of employment and in low spirits. Her father is a Canadian Customs officer, and her sister is in a Boston convent. She left letters addressed to a young man in St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown. She came here three months ago.

At the police court yesterday morning Patrick Dogherly and Chas. D. Collins were each fined \$100 or three months for infraction of the Prohibitory Act. The case against John Carroll, for a breach of the same Act, and a second one against C. D. Collins were adjourned till August 5th. Four drunks were each fined \$2 or 10 days judgement in the case of John Horne for a breach of the Lord's Day Act will be given on August 3rd.

THE election trial of Murdoch McKinnon vs. A. F. Bruce, commenced at Georgetown yesterday before Mr. Justice Hodgson. The counsel in attendance are:—Morson, K. C., McLean, K. C., for petitioner, and D. A. McKinnon, K. C., for respondent. The petition in this case was brought by Murdoch McKinnon, the defeated Conservative candidate, against A. F. Bruce, member elect on the Government side for the Murray Harbor District. It includes a scrutiny as well as the examination into other charges.

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THE handsome French cruiser Isly, Commander Montferand, of the Newfoundland Squadron arrived in port yesterday. She is of 4,000 tons, has a complement of 300 men and carries a primary battery of four 6 inch guns, six 4.5 inch and ten 6 pounders, all quick firing. Her officers made some inquiries for information of the Fishery Department as to the result of bait-freezing stations. A formal call was made at Government House in the morning and in the afternoon His Honor was received on board as were also U. S. Consul Vail and Mayor Warburton. As the representatives of Britain and the United States respectively left the ship their national flags were run up and saluted. The officers later paid a formal call to Consul Vail. The Isly sails this morning.

THURSDAY was St. Ann's day, but the Indians of the Maritime Provinces celebrated the feast on Sunday. The Moncton Transcript says: Representatives of the aborigines have been arriving at Buctouche all week, the first on the ground being Mark Paul of Indian Point, Westmorland County. Paul, who is about 80 years of age, and an ex-chief, was accompanied by his spouse, and they carried a number of bundles, presumably containing blankets and provisions to last them during their stay in Buctouche. Paul, though bent with age, still gives evidence of stature worthy a chief, he being six feet tall and weighing in his prime probably over 200 pounds. There was excursions from all parts, the first to arrive at Buctouche being a schooner load from Tignish, P. E. Island. A company of several hundred Indians were present and many others were attracted by the celebration. A sermon in the Indian language preached in the morning by the Rev. Father Paquette, of Restigouche, a Capuchin monk, and the music was also Indian. In the afternoon the blessing of a statue of St. Anne took place. The Indians were dressed in all their finery while the chiefs among them wore their insignia of office and altogether it was a spectacle now rarely seen in any part of the country.

ACADIANISM.—The third number of Acadianism has been received, and, like the second number, it is an enlargement upon that immediately preceding, containing, as it does, seventy-two pages of plated matter, in addition to several illustrations. The second of the series of articles upon Acadian Book-Pictos deals with those used by the late John Medley, D. D., Bishop of Fredericton, by the late Edward Allison, the late William Richards Bustin, and several members of the Wetmore family. The second article is from the pen of that well-known writer upon Acadian affairs, Prof. W. F. Ganong, of Smith College, Northampton, Mass., and is entitled, "Lease of the Seigneurie of Frenouse on the St. John in 1693." Prof. A. B. deMille, of King's College, Windsor, contributes an interesting article upon "Certain Literary Possibilities," in which the subject is treated from a purely Acadian standpoint. Mr. James Vroom, of St. Stephen, is the author of an article upon "The Signature of Matthew Thornton," illustrated with specimens of the various signatures touched upon by the writer. Following this appear instalments of continued articles namely, "Hon. Judge Robie," by Mr. Israel Longworth, K. C.; "A Monument and its Story" by Mr. Jonas Howe, and "Incidents in the Early History of St. John" by Rev. W. O. Raymond, M. A. The two articles last named are concluded in the current issue. Dr. I. Allen Jaek, K. C., is the contributor of some excellent verses entitled, "Purification," and of an article touching upon the "Aesthetic Attributes of Acadia." The latter is a remarkably well written contribution, and is rich in poetic feeling and dramatic incident. Published quarterly at St. John, N. B., by Mr. D. R. Jaek.
