### DELINQUENT CHILDREN

Before Judge Inman, Judge of the Juvenile Court for the town of Summerside, in his Chambers in the Court House in Summerside on Friday, a number of children ranging in ages from 7 to 12 years were up on certain charges of delinquency, some accompanied by their parents, and others not. The Juvenile Court Committee from the Children's Aid Society, consisting of Dr. J. A. McPhee, President of the Society; Rev. J. J. McDonald, Miss Eleanor Green, Secretary and George B. McNutt, Vice President, were in attendance; also the probation officer, Mr. Vincent J. Harrington, and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., the solicitor of the Society. Evidence was taken of the various offences alleged to have been committed. Mr. Heath Strong brought to the attention of the court the provision of the Juvenile Delinquent's Act of 1929, whereby the word "child" means a boy or girl apparently or actually under the age of 16 years; and that the Juvenile Court had exclusive jurisdiction over such in regard to any offence committed by a child against either a dominion or provincial statute, or municipal by-law. The Court, he pointed out, has a discretion in regard to indictable offences committed by a child over 14 years, in which latter case the court might order the child to be proceeded against by indictment. Mr. Strong also drew attention of the court to the provision of the act providing that where the child has been adjudged guilty of an offence and fined, if the court considered the parents or guardian did not exercise proper care of their children, the parents or guardians themselves might be ordered to pay the fine and costs and in default of payment thereof the same to be levied on their goods and chattels by a distress, and in default of such distress the parents or guardians to be imprisoned. The Court adjourned till December 6th in order that notices in that behalf might be served on the parents and guardians. S.

### DON'T CHANGE TARIFF SAYS PROF. GOFORTH

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—"That the effect of substantial protection duties is to lower the prices of their product to the consumer, and on that ground cannot safely be changed," is the contention of Professor W. W. Goforth of McGill University in a brief recently presented to the advisory board on tariff and taxation at Ottawa. He presented the brief on behalf of the Dominion Oilcloth and Linoleum Co. Ltd. and Congoleum Canada Ltd.

"There has been a greater reduction in the price of domestic oilcloth products in recent years than in the general scale of Canadian prices," the brief states, "and no advantage is taken of the tariff to increase the cost of these goods to the consumer. "On the contrary, Canadian oilcloth products sell more cheaply in their own market than corresponding goods in either Great Britain or the United States. In fact, these goods are apparently priced lower in Canada than anywhere else in the world," the report continued.

### RED CROSS SALE OF CHRISTMAS SEALS

The annual campaign carried on by the Canadian Tuberculosis Association through the Red Cross Society in connection with the sale of Christmas seals at this season of the year is now in full swing. These seals are very attractive and at this festive season should adorn every letter and parcel sent through the post. It signifies that the sender has kept in mind those less fortunate than himself or herself and is doing what is possible to combat tuberculosis and to assist our crippled children to get rid of their bodily defects. The proceeds are expended in this Province by the Red Cross Society and it may be of interest to readers to know that during the present year the Red Cross nurses made 419 visits to tuberculosis patients in different parts of the Island. Twenty-two chest clinics were held in rural districts, 52 in this city and 12 in Summerside. 105 non active cases of tuberculosis were discovered besides 57 suspicious subjects are under observation. In addition 519 chest examinations were made, and nearly 200 Prince of Wales College students examined.
