### Naughty Marietta Repeat Performance At Capitol Theatre

The management of the Capitol Theatre, Summerside, by popular request, repeated "Naughty Marietta," at the Capitol last night and drew a record house.

This charming picture has all the romance of Creole days in New Orleans, with gorgeous music by Victor Herbert.

Jeanette MacDonald, thrilled the audience with her acting, co-starring with Nelson Eddy, eminent American operatic baritone.

Directed by W. S. Van Dyke, "The Man" fame, it tells a graphic story of the settlement of New Orleans by the French in the days of Louis XV and of the love of a disguised French princess, seeking escape from a marriage of state, and an English officer.

The new photoplay is based on the Victor Herbert masterpiece in which Emma Trentini and Orville Harrold first starred on the stage. The dramatic side of the adventure, thrills and perils of the period is stressed as a thundering background for the glamorous music.

Such song hits as "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life," "I'm Falling in Love with Someone," "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," "The Italian Street Song," and all the original music of the operetta is retained with new lyrics by Gus Kahn, of the famous song team of Donaldson and Kahn.

Among the dramatic highlights are the flight from Paris, the battle with the pirates at sea, the capture of the Casquette Girls, the march of the scouts through the everglades, the routing of the pirates, the New Orleans marriage market.

Twice Passed By

The Florann neared the Nova Scotia coast tonight, battling heavy seas and a strong northwest wind. Two other vessels sped to her assistance.

At the same time she ended the attempts of more than a year to share with Colombia and other large coffee-producing nations the cost of balancing world supply with demand.

To prevent damaging speculation the Finance Ministry ordered coffee exchanges at Rio de Janeiro, Santos and Victoria closed indefinitely while the Government worked out a new coffee program.

It added that the government would provide banking assistance, reduce taxes and take other remedial measures to spend the export of Brazil's huge coffee crop and assist Brazilian growers to compete favorably in foreign markets.

Mrs. Griffiths took seriously ill last April, but after spending some time in the hospital at Campbellton, N. B., she was removed to the home of her sister Mrs. W. L. Johnston, Margate, where she made a wonderful recovery. Her friends all had hoped that she had regained her health as she was able to return to her home in September. Favorable reports continued to come concerning her health and it was thought that she was still improving. Although no definite particulars were received it is supposed that she suffered another stroke and passed away at midnight, November 2nd.

Mr. and Mrs. MacLean are leaving on Thursday morning to attend the funeral and probably will not return until next week.

Mrs. Griffith was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Staver of Kelvin. She leaves to mourn, her husband the Rev. D. L. Griffiths, the following sisters, Mrs. Margaret Bailey, Reads Perry, N. H.; Mrs. Rev. M. J. McPherson, Port Elgin, N. B.; Mrs. A. E. MacLean, Summerside, P. E. I.; Mrs. W. L. Johnston, Margate.

Another sister Mrs. Robt. Hutchinson, Central Lot 16, Preetown, died some years ago. Two brothers, William Staver, Kelvin, and Edmund Staver, Preetown, also survive.

The funeral takes place from her late residence on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Much sympathy is extended to Mrs. MacLean in her sad bereavement. S

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### Miss Georgie MacLean Addresses I. O. D. E. In Summerside

The feature of this month's meeting of the Daughters of the Empire, Summerside, was a splendid address by Miss Georgie MacLean, B.A., M.A., on her recent visit to England and Europe.

Miss MacLean, who went over to London to study at the London University was given many opportunities to study English history and literature through the kindly hospitality of the Victoria League in London, which is affiliated with the Daughters of the Empire. Miss MacLean spoke in the highest terms of the hospitality of the English people.

Miss MacLean gave some interesting lectures on Canada (at the request of the secretary of the Victoria League) to groups of school children and social clubs. Her first lecture was at St. Peter's Women's Fellowship in the heart of London and where Miss MacLean had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Lamson, wife of the head of the firm of C. M. Lamson and Co., one of the largest fur companies in the world.

Miss MacLean as representing Prince Edward Island in the "Associated Country Women of the World" met many interesting people, in a group of about forty people with Lady Eleanor Cole acting president, and the wives of foreign ambassadors representing their particular countries, on the executive.

Miss MacLean recounted many things that she saw in old historic London that reminded her of Dickens and many other great people of the past. One thing of particular interest was the visit to the Dew Pond on the Downs, one of the relics of the Roman civilization.

Miss MacLean was also given every opportunity to study English methods of education. She was very impressed with their system and especially the slogan of "Discover" which is to say the pupil is allowed to discover for himself and to find his own level.

The English educational authorities, believe that when a child has reached the age of eleven years the teacher has a pretty good idea of his ability to learn and the examinations are set for that age. Those that show more than average ability generally win scholarships, and are sent to secondary schools with a few going on to the universities, but if they are only average they are taught some trade, to fit them to earn their living.

Every child is taught English History, Geography, physical training, music and art and some selection of craft work.

The girls are taught domestic science, many of the schools having model flats attached where two or four girls spend a week at a time under a house mother. Here they do all the cleaning, redecorating when necessary, cooking and keeping a budget within a certain fixed allowance. Their domestic science always stresses balanced meals at cheapest prices and it is something that is very practical.

Another thing that is very practical is the use of the sewing machine. The girls are taught to make their own clothes and to mend their own clothes. This is a very practical one and best suited for the masses but whether it would be workable in small communities Miss MacLean was not quite sure as it would entail more expense.

England is giving an indispensable minimum to all and secondary education to a small number likely to benefit.

A hearty vote of thanks was given to Miss MacLean for her excellent talk.

Mrs. Mary Hunt presided at the meeting and the regular business was transacted. It was decided to continue supplying 100 children with milk through the winter months and it was suggested that the Town Council be asked to take care of the thirty or more needy children in the High School.

The keeping of Remembrance Day was discussed and it was decided to place a wreath on the monument as usual.

It was voted that a message of sympathy be sent to Mrs. Taylor on her recent bereavement, and also that the sick committee visit Mrs. C. D. MacCallum, a very faithful member of the order.

Peace Week from Nov. 8 to 14 was discussed and it was suggested that the ministers of the various churches be asked to preach on the subject during that period.

Mrs. Eric MacKay was initiated into the Order and Miss Ross proposed as a new member. —S

Not far behind in these attributes were the entries of Stewart & Lewis, who captured second and third places, with Ira Carr fourth, Arthur Dawson fifth.

Light Medium Silver Female Pups. This was another big class and a difficult one to judge. However, when they had all been sized up, J. R. Lockerby, a frequent winner yesterday, was at the top. Loyd Lockerby, second, Roy Woodside third and Stewart & Lewis fourth.

Adult Pale Silver Males. This class was not nearly as large as expected, but it had as an entry Roy Woodside's last year's champion and several other tops. Roy was again sitting at the head of the table when the smoke of battle cleared, with Brent Howatt second, Stewart & Lewis third, Brent Howatt fourth.

Yearling Pale Silver Males. This was a big class of very fine foxes, good back necks, clear sparkling silver. Stewart & Lewis had the edge on W. B. McArthur with J. R. Lockerby third, S. R. Johnson fourth and Ira Carr fifth.

Adult Pale Silver Females. W. B. McArthur, whose foxes have been making such an inroad in the prize list all through in almost every class, won, with Ralph Muttart second, Roy Woodside third, Kildare Fox Company fourth.

Judging will commence this morning shortly after nine o'clock with the remainder of the pale silver classes to be completed, followed by the extra pales. It is possible that some of the breeds may also be judged during the afternoon and if this can be accomplished the whole show might be completed by one or two o'clock on Friday.

In the competition for the Canada Packers' cup which is awarded to the exhibitor making the highest number of points in classes one to six, H. G. Muttart, Summerside, is leading, with Stewart & Lewis second, J. R. Lockerby third and W. B. McArthur fourth.
