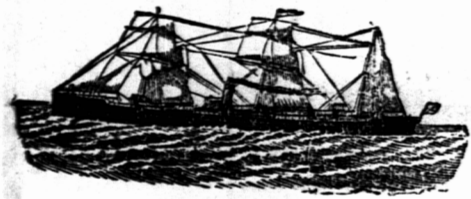

CARNEGIE'S GIFT TO SCOTLAND.

Andrew Carnegie has crowned his many munificent benefactions by the offer of ten million dollars to the four Scotch universities "for the purpose of making the higher education free to every boy in Scotland." This is his largest single gift so far, and certainly one of the grandest in its scope and possibilities. Fifty two years ago as the son of a poor weaver, at eleven years of age he came to America to seek his fortune. To-day after bestowing millions for libraries and educational purposes in the United States, the land of his adoption, he turns with true national feeling to remember with more than princely generosity the land that gave him birth.

Scotland has long enjoyed a school system superior to anything in the British Isles, and which has been the precursor to the best educational plans of the new world. It was conceived and partly initiated by John Knox, 350 years ago. His plan was to have primary schools, secondary schools and colleges, all to be supported by taxation and all to be free, with compulsory education for all as far as practicable. To this system the intellectual activity and ability which have long characterised the Scottish people are very largely due.

It is mentioned that an English journal of some prominence has expressed the hope that the generous proposal of Mr. Carnegie will be rejected as "an invasion of the almighty dollar," and as a reflection upon the inability of Scotland to provide sufficiently for higher education. This suggestion is not likely to be acted upon. We fail to see any reason why the Scottish people should not accept the proffered gift, the more so as Mr. Carnegie is a native of the land of the heather. All countries hitherto, including Canada, have been most willing to accept bequests and donations from their generous sons for educational purposes. The fact that Mr. Carnegie's gift is the largest yet offered in this line is alike creditable to him and to the land of his birth.

Congratulations to Stipendiary McDonald. It looks now that his appointment is a permanent one.

We learn from the Patriot that tenders for the repair and maintenance of 20 of the road districts have been accepted by the Government, leaving 15 to be arranged for in the near future. We believe there is a fair prospect under the new system for the Province to secure better roads than heretofore at a considerably less outlay.

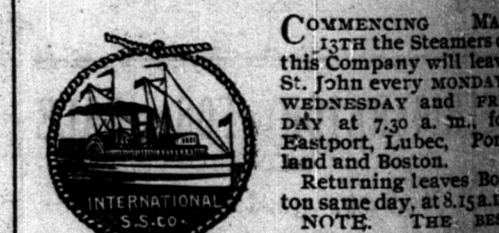
