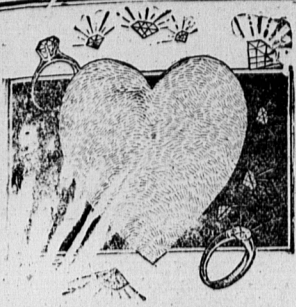

In yesterday's issue it was said that Mrs. Jessie Hoag, City, was in Sherbrook, P. Q. This was incorrect and The Guardian regrets its publication.

A sad ending to what was intended to be a most enjoyable Thanksgiving occurred at Mt. Stewart early Tuesday morning. On the preceding Saturday Mrs. Charles Rattray, of Union Road left home for Mt. Stewart to spend a few days with her aunts Mrs. Mathieson and Miss Shaw. While at the former's house she took seriously ill and passed away at 2 a. m. on Tuesday, death being due to hemorrhage of the stomach. She had been complaining several weeks ago of feeling unwell, but on Saturday, seemed in good health and spirits, and her sudden death was a terrible shock to relatives and friends. She was the daughter of David Shaw, Covehead, and was in her 44th year. She leaves a sorrowing husband, four sons and two daughters to mourn. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at Covehead Cemetery.

The presentation of Sis Hopkins by Williams and Swan at the People's Theatre last night was something worth seeing. The audiences, which were large and appreciative, were kept in roars of laughter from start to finish and so great was the success of the act that the management has decided to engage them for the rest of the week. The People's Theatre is a credit to the city and to its capable management.

The death of little Ewen McKenzie, youngest son of John Thomas McKenzie, formerly of Murray River, but recently resident in Charlottetown, has evoked more than ordinary sympathy and cast a gloom over a large circle of relatives and friends. Ewen was a favorite with all and called forth the admiration and love of all who knew him. He was a boy of exceptional fine spirit, deeply thoughtful, always kind and considerate of others and winning his way by the gentle strength of his bright and beautiful life. Though but twelve years of age he had made his profession of faith in Christ, and became a member in full communion with Zion Church in Charlottetown. His life at the same time by the Christian ministry, and in it all he was thoroughly genuine. Two weeks ago he was suddenly stricken with cerebral meningitis and was taken to the P. E. I. Hospital where he passed away on Wednesday last. The funeral service from his father's home on Hillsboro St. Friday afternoon was most impressive. Rev. Geo. P. Ross officiated and was assisted by Rev. A. J. McNeil of Murray River who had hastened from vacation to be present on the occasion. The order of recruits for the ministry to which Ewen belonged met in Zion Church at 1.45, engaged in devotional exercises and then formed in procession and attended the service. At the house they surrounded the floral laden casket and six of their number acted as pallbearers, viz: Donald McLean, Maudie McKinnon, Neil Rattay, Harold Raynor, Colin McNeill and George McLeod. The Order of Recruits led the procession to the People's Cemetery where interment was made. At the committal they formed a circle round the open grave and each placed a white chrysanthemum upon the casket of the departed corpse. Rev. Donald McLean assisted in the service. The funeral was very largely attended and many were the expressions of sympathy with the family so suddenly and sorely bereaved of a bright and happy life.

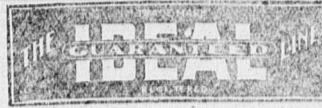

Pursuant to, and by virtue of, a decretal order made in the above cause on the third day of October, A. D. 1910, by the Honorable the Vice-Chancellor, and to me entrusted for execution, I will set up and sell at public auction on the premises, on Wednesday, the 10th day of November next (1910), at the hour of twelve o'clock noon, all that tract, piece or parcel of land situated lying and being on Lot 22 in Queen's County bounded as follows, that is to say:—
