Countess Sees New Interests In Old Castle

LONDON, July 7.—Lady Tweedsmuir's experiences in Canada as the Governor-General during her visit in England are proving entertaining to her friends.

At a meeting of the Canadian Group at the Overseas Club at which she was guest of honor, she said she had done almost everything in Canada and had "even worn trousers" in the West. Lady Willingdon, wife of a former Governor-General, Tweedsmuir's exploits in the Dominion had exceeded her own, she said, "I've never worn them."

The Countess of Egmont is another visitor from Canada whose experiences are interesting to people in England. The tall, shy girl Moody—who never expected to come into a title, is taking all the grandeur that goes with it simply and more or less as a matter of course.

To a reporter fortunate enough to meet her at a large tea at the Canadian High Commissioner's home, she confessed that at first she had been terrified, but that she had found the people that really mattered just as nice as the people at home, though of course there were the "high haters," but there are those everywhere.

In the grounds of the great castle the Canadian-born Earl inherited by her father, she immediately returned to Canada after a visit to the continent. They will bring their four-year-old son to England to be educated among boys with whom he will grow up.

The Countess' chief worry was the modernizing of the castle. If, as may happen, this proves impossible she may have to find a smaller and more convenient home. For as she explained, servants who will put up with out-of-date equipment have vanished and a castle requires a staff.

Solving Old Problem

The servant problem in England tends to be a near-solution.

The Union of Domestic Workers is an organization duly appointed by the Trade Union Congress. Miss Bezzant, who has training and qualifications that appear to fit her admirably for this trying job, came as an assistant teacher, and she went to a working women's college on a scholarship. She left the college as a member of the domestic staff, then went to Oxford on a bursary. She left the university with a diploma in education and political science, a certificate in social training.

"Long hours are the worst trouble of domestic service," is her contention. "There is no necessity for them. If you have proper organization, no household servant need work more than eight hours a day."

A few days after Miss Bezzant's appointment, the National Executive Committee of the National Council for Women submitted a report of nine points or "Maid's Minimum" to Ernest Brown, minister of labor. Nearly 1,000,000 women in British homes help to make it, and thousands of copies will be printed in time for the annual jubilee meeting of the International Council at Edinburgh on July 11.

The nine points lay down detailed conditions on free time, holidays, overtime, fringe wages, travel, and thousands of copies will be printed in time for the annual jubilee meeting of the International Council at Edinburgh on July 11.

Minimum wages for resident maids fixed at £10 a week and £16 and £25 for girls of 16 and over. Separate bed, bath, warm bedroom, comfort for off-time spent in the house, adequate and modern food, and proper working equipment are other points.

The latest hints to housewives on household economies and diet are being issued by no less an authority than the British Medical Association in a booklet priced modestly at sixpence. It shows that a diet of five—parents and three children aged six to 14—can live healthily on food costing only £7.14 per week.

It is given with full shopping lists. The diet was compiled by a committee of doctors and expert cooks.

Another long list of household expenses appeared recently in the papers. This time, however, they were concerned not so much with economy as with extravagance. It is calculated by those supposed to know that the London season—two weeks with the climax about week—means a turnover of at least \$30,000,000.
