But while she will be much missed in the church and in the various social activities it is in the home that her loss will be felt most keenly and there, more than by her husband and all others, she will be missed by the little ones. IDEAL HOT WEATHER DESSERTS

Dainty desserts with a minimum of trouble and no suffering from heat, over a gas range or cook stove can be provided by fresh fruits. They are always tempting and lend themselves to various dainty and attractive forms of serving. An old superstition that cooking removed unhealthful qualities that existed in raw fruits has long since been exploded. The only danger lies in such a fruit, which has been overhandled by hands that were not overclean. A bath at the kitchen sink will remedy this danger, if it really is a serious one. There are no records of any dangerous diseases having been communicated in this way.

Peaches in their own velvety coats of yellow and red or white and bluish are a fine catch dessert for anybody, eaten out of hand. Pile it in attractively, they are an ornament to the table and with the pretty paper doilies and napkins now so commonly sold they can be dressed up most attractively with no burden to the family laundry. Fresh berries, peaches, pears, grapes, any of the seasonable fruit attractively served fill the purpose of dessert most gratifyingly and with a minimum of work at the time when work is most irksome. Fruit desserts will be in season for three months. Each of the various fruits lends itself to a variety of forms of dessert, either raw or cooked. Crushed and frozen into ices, in gelatin as a salad, and with whipped cream, are simple ways of serving uncooked fruit. The chief task of importance in selecting the fruit in the market for quality and freshness. Some of the most attractive forms of the various fruits are not of as fine flavor as others of less attractive appearance; a little experimenting will demonstrate this fact. Some connoisseurs select the white-skinned peaches as of finer flavor than the handsome yellow and red checked varieties. Both are good, but you may find one sort superior. It is worth while trying. Dealers complain that the white-skinned sorts are not as good sellers. They are at least equal in flavor and the white skin should not deter a purchaser if the yellow sorts are absent.
