SITUATION IN RUHR VALLEY BECOMES INCREASINGLY ACUTE

Reported to Paris Officials that Germans Preparing for Sudden Coup. Meanwhile French Proceed with Confiscations. Germany's Wealthiest Coal Baron Must Make Terms with France or Face Ruin.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 21.—Ailed authorities have been informed that German secret organizations are preparing an attack on all Allied troops occupying the Ruhr, according to the Exchange Telegraphs, Paris correspondent today.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—French penalties for Germans obstructing or disobeying orders in coal duties include fines of 100,000,000 marks and imprisonment up to five years. A Daily News despatch said today.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—France is about to construct a 6,000 ton submarine liner. It is announced it will be planned for use as a troopship and will be capable of carrying several hundred men.

PARIS, Jan. 21.—The French high command has information that leads it to fear the Germans will attempt a coup in the Ruhr in a few days according to unofficial despatches from Dusseldorf today. The despatch said the French officials would also be seized, but there were no such confiscations here.

COBLENZ, Jan. 21.—The French activity today gave rise to the fear among the population that the Ruhr would also be seized, but there were no such confiscations here. The French are operating throughout the British area around Cologne the British agreeing not to oppose the French actions so long as their application does not involve the use of British troops.

BERLIN, Jan. 21.—The garrison at Muenster has been withdrawn to prevent a clash with the French if the latter's advance is continued. Government officials said that the garrison is in a state of excitement and that even a lieutenant is capable of an irresponsible act which would precipitate another world war.

BERLIN, Jan. 21.—Hugo Stinnes has been trapped by the French occupation of the Ruhr. He has taken pains to keep away from the Ruhr personally, letting the other iron masters face the French but they have caught him finally. Royal Commission To Investigate Alleged Combine

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Jan. 21.—As a result of an investigation which has been going on for the past few months, action has been taken by the government to further investigate an alleged combine among steamship companies having lakes Superior, Huron and Erie as a base of operation.

Fielding Reports to Prime Minister

OTTAWA, Jan. 21.—A report from Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, to the negotiation of the appointment of a royal commission to enquire into the alleged combine of shipping interests in its effort to dominate and control the freight rates and terms under which grain has been carried from the harbors of Fort William and Port Arthur.

PARIS, Jan. 21.—Eighteen German industrial leaders arrested for obstructing occupation orders of French in Ruhr, sent to Mayence for trial, probably Monday's strike by workers of all classes threatened in consequence.
