RICE SCARCER AND ADVANCING.—Rice cannot now be bought in the Maritime provinces for less than 12 cents a pound, says the Maritime Merchant. That is to say a wholesaler basing his price on present cost would have to get at least that much in order to sell rice profitably. A year or two ago the use of rice was advocated because of the high price and scarcity of many other foods, but now it is becoming dear and scarce. In some oriental countries the export of rice is prohibited, because there is here food conservation is becoming imperative. Besides, transportation on the Pacific is much restricted and even the rice which is obtained, it is doubtful if it could be brought to this continent in anything like sufficient quantities.

GERMANS USED UP TWELVE DIVISIONS AT KEMMEL HILL

LONDON, May 4.—A representative of General Radcliffe, Director of Military Operations at the War Office today summed up the military situation on the western front as follows:

"In the north while the Germans failed in their main objective they made their flanks secure by the capture of Kemmel, but we must regard the operation from the viewpoint of economy of men and they used up five divisions from the general reserve, besides seven of eight divisions previously employed."

"The results of the past week on the whole were satisfactory because the enemy used up a larger number of fresh divisions than the Allies without strategic result. In all he used on the north front thirty-five fresh divisions, besides the nine divisions already there."

"The effect of the operations in the north will be to deduct materially the number of fresh divisions the Germans have available."

"As to the future, the Germans have large numbers of divisions recovering which can be used shortly. It is difficult to make an exact comparison of the staying powers of the two armies, but the facts show we are in our favor. If the enemy continues his offensive in the north he must impair his chances of success in the south."

"The main aim is to separate the Anglo-French armies in the south, and if the enemy continues the campaign in the north without important results he is using up his forces to no purpose."

HERE'S CALIF. WOMAN WHO PLANTS IN EGG SHELLS TO USE LIME AS FERTILIZER.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Well what next? Mrs. J. A. Abgrave of Galt, (Sacramento Co.) Calif., got an early start with her war garden by planting in egg shells placed in a box of earth she could thus utilize the lime from the shells for fertilizer. In writing the National War Garden Commission for a garden book she tells of her success and how she has now transplanted her plants to her back yard garden.

MEMORIAL ERECTED TO LATE MAJOR HARVIE

Fitting Tribute to Memory of Prince Edward Island Soldier Who Died in South Africa.

The following clipping from the Rand Daily Mail, Johannesburg, S. A. was received recently by Major A. A. Barthelemy, this city, from Mr. Willard Kennedy, who resided for a year or more at Southport, after having been many years in South Africa. He recently returned to South Africa, accompanied by Mrs. Kennedy and child.

The late Major Harvie, to whom reference is made, was a brother of Mrs. W. W. Stanley and an uncle of Major J. W. Stanley.

THE LATE MAJOR HARVIE. Memorial Stone Unveiled at Brixton. A memorial stone erected by the comrades of Major W. L. Harvie was unveiled at Brixton Cemetery yesterday afternoon in the presence of a large and representative gathering of soldiers and citizens. The late Major Harvie was for many years associated with the Transvaal Volunteers, Force, and later served in this military district as an officer of the Permanent Force (Staff). After serving through the Boer War he was attached to the C.S.A.R. Volunteers and the Wit Rilles. He served in the Zululand (1906) and in German South-West. He died in January, 1916, as the result of disease contracted during the operations in the latter campaign.

The brief service in front of the memorial was prefaced by the singing of the National Anthem. After prayer, the hymn "O God, our help in ages past" was sung, and then the Rev. J. C. Penttill delivered a short address. The speaker said that, although he was not personally acquainted with the deceased officer, it was obvious from the nature and large dimensions of the gathering that afternoon that he was loved and honored. The dead officer had given fifteen years' service to the Empire and he died in khaki, which was an emblem, the speaker thought, that the world had come to honor. Colonel Smith and Panchaud then unveiled the memorial stone, and simultaneously Corp. Leach of the S.A.P. sounded the "Last Post" whilst all ranks stood to attention. The benediction closed a short but impressive ceremony.

Among those present were Mrs. Harvie and child, the Mayor of Johannesburg (Mr. T. F. Allen), Col. H. Temple-Marsell, A. D. M. S., Lieut. A. W. Stanley, Lieut. Col. H. G. Panchaud, Lieut. Col. T. Atkins, Lieut. Col. Gordon Sandilands, Major Blaney, D.S.O. (District Staff Officer), Major A. Brown, Major Morrison, Major Humby, Captains Bevers, Batty, Bradley, V. C. Nairn, Beatt, Kerr, Howarth, Slade, Jackson, Pettie, Donald, Humphill, McInosh, A. Ross, Lewis, D. Smith, Dyer, Grosse, McCarthy, Forsythe, Sergt. Major Newberry, Q.M.S.'s Wright, Gallow and Oliver, Staff-Sergt. Instructors Lee-Smith and Wilkinson. A detachment of police was also present. Several handsome wreaths were placed on the memorial stone after the unveiling, among them being emblematic with the care of the grave and in the form of the L.L.H. and Wit Rilles. Mr. Bayne, the curator at the cemetery, has been very helpful in connection with the erection of the memorial.
