ANNUALS — FLOWERS FOR EVERYBODY

Many annuals indispensable for cut flowers and giving a great show of bloom have such a short season or one so late in the season that they are not desirable for the flower garden. The aster is one of these. While there is no annual that gives more beauty and a greater wealth of bloom when well grown, the bed it occupies will be flowerless for the first half of the summer, until August and September.

Cosmos is another late-blooming annual. Bachelor's buttons or centaureas are early bloomers, but of short season.

Cutting gardens in conjunction with the vegetables are the best place for plants of this nature where they can be grown in rows and cultivated effectively as the vegetables. It is also undesirable to strip beds in the flower garden of bloom for bouquets when the garden and surplus rows of plants for cutting can be grown in the cutting garden.

Plants for cutting which will flourish better with constant cultivation and fertilizing such as the vegetable receive include asters, stocks, scabiosas, or mourning brides, the marigold, calendulas, annual chrysanthemums, sweet peas and gladiolus bulbs.

Gardens of large extent now have a cutting patch devoted exclusively to annuals, perennials and bulbs to furnish bouquets, while the plants in the flower garden are left to give their display and only the fading bloom is cut to maintain the plant in blooming condition. It is a practical idea, and one well worth practicing. As the cutting garden is not intended for display there is no compunction about cutting the bloom with lavish hand.

It furnishes a supply of bloom to give away to guests when the generous gardener would hesitate to cut the bloom from beds in the garden and ruin the display, but would probably do so.

Intensive culture all season with the application of fertilizer is much more practical when flowers for cutting are grown in a reserve garden, as are the vegetables.

Will Omit Usual Congratulations

PARIS, May 12.—The French, British, Italian and Belgian Governments have decided to omit the usual formal congratulations to the newly elected Chief of State in the case of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, Germany's President elect, in view of the fact that his name is still on the list of those charged with war crimes. The four powers it is said will simply forward a brief Acknowledgement of his assumption of the Presidency.

OTTAWA, May 12.—A large party of Western members of Parliament will visit the Maritime Provinces between May 20 and May 25. Robert Forke, Progressive leader, expects to accompany the party if satisfactory arrangements can be made. The party will leave Ottawa on Wednesday, May 20, stopping at Bathurst, Moncton, and Edmundston in New Brunswick, Colchester and Pictou Counties in Nova Scotia, and then proceed to Prince Edward Island, leaving Charlottetown for Ottawa on Monday, May 25.

All the Western Provinces will be represented by members of Parliament in the party.

Wheatley River To Have Memorial

An enthusiastic meeting was held at Wheatley River last evening to decide on matters in connection with the erection of a war memorial. The desire of the people to have a suitable Memorial was pronounced and its erection was decided on. A contract was given Mr. Ballingall to supply a black granite shaft and Mr. Alex Doiron undertook to have a suitable foundation prepared. Mr. Victor Ling was appointed to secure the proper initials and names and particulars which are to be inscribed on the monument. Mr. Watson Smith volunteered to secure the site for the monument which it was proposed to have erected on the East side of the river.

An offer from Mr. Sandy McGregor to put on a concert next week in aid of the funds was greatly appreciated and accepted unanimously.

Wheatley River, gave ten men who made the Supreme Sacrifice and their names will be inscribed on the Monument. It was decided to have the unveiling ceremony on the 19th July. As this date is the anniversary of the signing of Peace in 1919 it was felt that it was most suitable and would meet with the support of the public.

The King Decides Against Any More Royal Residences

(Associated Press)

LONDON, May 12.—Disregarding ancient precedent set down by Roman emperors, King George recently declined to accept a legacy of Gwyrch Castle in Wales and \$250,000 for its upkeep, bequeathed to him in trust by the Countess of Dundonald who died last year leaving an estate valued at more than \$1,000,000. Hope was expressed in the countess' will that the castle would become a permanent residence for the kings of England and for the princes of Wales, but as the bequest has been declined by the ruler the property will pass, according to directions, to the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in England. The castle will be used by the order as a priory for residential and administrative purposes.

In connection with King George's refusal to receive a legacy it is recalled here that the Roman emperors, from Augustus to the private estates, as was the custom, by means of legacies from their loyal subjects.

dleton; Lewis Toombs, Cavendish; S. B. Aitken, Montague; W. C. MacNeil, Brackley; Wallace MacLaine, West River; J. M. MacLeod, Vernon Bridge; Murdoch Ross, Charlottetown; W. T. Huggan, Charlottetown.

There was a large docket before the court. Mr. Mulligan gave notice of motion that at the close of the Presbytery meeting he would protest against the Presbytery entering Union.

The clerk reported that he had received notice from the Presbytery of North Bay stating that application is being made to receive Rev. James Youngston of the Established Church of Scotland into the Presbyterian Church at the approaching General Assembly meeting early in June.

An appeal from Rev. A. M. MacLeod of Glace Bay, Treasurer of the Special Benevolent Fund asking for assistance for needy dependents on this charitable fund was read. There were protests received in regard to the manner of voting on the Church Union question by petitioners from Hunter River, Mount Stewart and Glenwood, Lot 8 these to be considered later. A special effort is being made to erect a memorial tablet in Lot 16 church where the first Presbytery meeting was held more than one hundred years ago. A representative Presbytery Committee consisting of Rev. J. C. Martin and Messrs Stirling MacKay and W. H. MacGregor was appointed to lead out in securing funds and arranging for the erection of this memorial of an historical event. Messrs. A. J. MacNeil and A. W. Robertson resigned as Commissioners to the Assembly and Messrs. J. M. MacLeod and E. Lockhart were appointed in their places.

Rev. C. U. MacNevin reported for the Presbytery Library and Memorial Bursary Committee, \$231 were raised for the bursary where as \$1,000 was asked for. Efforts will be made to gather library books which are now scattered among the members. The Special Committee on the Cavendish Manse situation reported, naming New Glasgow as the locality recommended. The old manse was sold for \$600. Special efforts will be made to secure subscriptions for a new building though building operations will not likely begin until after June tenth.

Several churches reported non-concurrence in regard to Church Union vote. It was unanimously agreed that the proper officials report to the Presbytery Clerk the vote in all congregations, the same to be incorporated in the minutes. An account will also be taken of any churches entering Union without a formal vote. The forenoon session closed at 1 p.m. and resumed business at half-past two in the afternoon.

The Moderator reported for the Committee on Religious Education, Special attention was called to the value of memorising hymns, select scripture passages and Catechism as an excellent training. Mr. Gillis reported for the Committee to visit Hunter River to act with the session to prepare a communion roll for Hunter River. At the first meeting of committee nothing was done owing to the session not being constituted. At the second meeting eleven names were added to the roll by vote of committee and session. These eleven persons later on coming to vote, were refused baptism. Dissatisfaction has since been expressed that a principle has been violated.

Messrs. Lockhart and Mulligan also reported further on the question. Mr. Stavert claimed he was following the Dominion Act. Those who had a moral right to vote were placed on the list, but there evidently was a difference of opinion as to those who were entitled to vote. There was a motion made by Mr. Christie, seconded by Mr. Lockhart, by which Presbytery approved of action of committee and session in preparing the roll at Hunter River and declare the ballot there null and void. This motion carried, though some protested against it. There was considerable discussion as to the rights of those entitled to vote at Hunter River owing to their being no previous communion roll.

It was moved, seconded and carried that Messrs. Lockhart, Mulligan, Stavert, Christie and Gillis be a committee to consider the situation immediately. Mr. Millar's resignation of New London was considered and Mr. Gillespie and Mr. Hugh Campbell spoke highly of his services and deeply regretted his leaving. A letter on behalf of the session, managers and congregation was read commending Mr. Millar and his services in the congregation for six years. It was agreed on motion that Mr. Millar's resignation be accepted at a date suitable to him and the congregation of New London. Mr. Gillis was appointed interim moderator of New London.

The resignation of Rev. M. J. Macpherson from the congregation of Tryon, Hampton, and Bonshaw and Borden was read. Expressions of regret were made by Presbytery and a letter in which strong words of appreciation of his services were given and a desire to retain them if his health permitted. This resignation on motion will be granted on June 10th next. Rev. D. K. Ross was appointed Interim Moderator of the vacancy.

The resignation of Rev. C. U. MacNevin of West River was also read. Messrs. Hugh MacMillan, Wallace MacLaine, Guilford Lowther, appealed to retain the services of Mr. MacNevin. The Union vote at Clyde River was a tie,

RAILWAY RATES

OTTAWA, May 12.—The repeal of the Crown's Nest Act in order to give the Railway Commission full authority and direction over the whole railway rate structure in Canada was urged upon the Government today by a delegation representing the Toronto Board of Trade and the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade.

The grounds for the request as cited by the delegation were discrimination and inequalities and general demoralization of business resulting from the present situation in regard to railway rates. It was pointed out that there was always the right to appeal from the decisions of the Railway Committee.

Premier King, Hon. George P. G. Lam, Minister of Railways and Canals and Hon. James A. Robb, Acting Minister of Finance received the delegation. The Premier said that the whole question of railway rates in Canada was being canvassed at present. He was pleased he said to receive the representatives,

while the West River vote was favorable to union. A resolution re Clyde River property was laid on the table and a committee consisting of Messrs. Gillis, Aitken, and Ross appointed to look into the situation. Mr. MacNevin's work was very highly regarded by the congregation and his resignation was accepted to take effect on June 10th. Rev. T. A. Wilson was appointed Interim Moderator, Rev. Geo. Grant was appointed to fill the place of A. J. MacNeil on the Home Mission Committee.
