N.S. Tournament Gets Underway

Favorites All Advance In First Day's Play Of Nova Scotia Tennis Championships.

SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 14.—(C.P.)—The defeat of Art Lavery, of Montreal, by W. N. Rice of North Sydney, several times provincial singles champion, featured the open day's play in the 1933 Nova Scotia tennis tournament being played here. The North Sydney ace won in straight sets by scores of 7-5, 6-4.

A total of 42 matches were run off today. Actually only 28 matches were played, the other 14 being defaulted. Of the 28 played, only three went the limit of three sets. J. G. Neary and R. Leslie, the Kentville combination in men's doubles, eliminated Milton Musgrave and Jock Lloyd, of Halifax, in a great three-set match by scores of 3-6, 6-6, 1, while in the women's singles, Miss M. MacDougall, Stellarton, defeated Miss E. MacNeill, Halifax, in three sets, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3.

In the other three-set match, D. G. Ross, New Glasgow, defeated J. N. Vickers, Sydney Mines, after losing the first set, 6-0. Ross won the next two, 6-4, 9-7.

Bob Barnard, I. Ross of Montreal, A. C. Wiswell, H. McLennan, B. Piers, B. Grant, all of Halifax, LeRoy Rennie, Toronto, "Red" Haire, Yarmouth, P. Aiken, Liverpool and W. N. Rice, North Sydney, all among the favorites in the men's singles advanced with easy wins while in the women's division, Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax, Miss Jean Wright, Bridgewater, Mrs. H. L. Beer, Ottawa and Miss E. Billing, all among the favored players, also scored first round wins without any difficulty.

The veteran doubles team of "Old" Wiswell, Halifax and Walter Rice, North Sydney, won their first round in men's doubles in two sets, as did Bev. Piers and Harry Roper, of Halifax. The defending champions in this event, Com. J. S. Edwards, Ottawa, and George Christie Bedford, paired together to defeat the Sydney team of T. Glover and O. Gunn, 6-1, 6-1.

Two Marksman Led With Perfect Day in MacDougall Challenge Cup Shoot.

CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ont., Aug. 14.—Sergeant Major R. Kiddle of Toronto and Trooper H. W. Probyn of Wayne, Alta., split the honors in the first big individual shoot of the Canadian "Bisley" today. Each posted a perfect score of 70 points to tie for the MacDougall Challenge Cup and split first and second money awards, each getting \$19. They will shoot off for the trophy.

What promises to be one of the finest meetings of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association has ever held—and it has been going since 1869—got under way on the far-spreading Connaught Ranges on the banks of Lake Deschenes today. Around 500 marksmen, the best in Canada, the team of English cadets who have been shooting at Long Branch, and four women airship shooters were on hand for the opening of the big shoot.

All purses divided 40, 25, 15, 12, and 8 percent. Entry fee 5 percent of purse, 5 percent from first and second money winners, and 3 percent from third and fourth money winners.

Six horses to enter, four to start. All drivers must wear a driver's uniform that will be satisfactory to the judges and management, and will not be allowed to drive without uniform.

In event of lights going out, or other causes that should hinder the Officials from seeing heat, right reserved to have heat raced over again.

Right reserved to change program, reject any entry, bar any driver, and to declare off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain a satisfactory number of entries or starters, to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, reopen or substitute another class without re-advancing, and alter or extend racing dates.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of one percent on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay instalments in full.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race providing the full 5 percent is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.
