THE GRIM REAPER

Whose Name is Death Claims Many for His Own.

George Graham passed to the higher life at the home of her sister, Mrs. Allen, R. Gibbons in Melrose, Mass., on Saturday 3rd ult., after a long and painful illness, which she bore with Christian resignation to the Divine Will. She leaves a father, John G. Graham of Murray Harbor North, P. E. I., five sisters, Mrs. Gibbons of Melrose, Mass., Mrs. Danford of Everett, Mass., Mrs. Barchard of Malden Mass., and Mrs. Wm. N. McKay and Miss Mabel Graham of Murray Harbor North of P. E. I., also two brothers Geo. Graham of and Ernest Graham of Arlington, Mass., to mourn the loss of their loved one. She was born in Murray Harbor North thirty-three years ago, and for the past eleven years had spent most of her time in Mass., except at intervals when she had visited her former home. Funeral services were conducted at her late residence in Melrose on Tuesday afternoon by the Rev. Thomas Sims, pastor of the Congregational Church of Melrose, assisted by the Oxford Quartette who rendered "Lead, kindly light," "Nearer, my God to Thee," and "Gathering Homeward" in a very acceptable manner. The floral offerings were very numerous and beautiful. Interment was at Wyoming cemetery.

There entered into rest at Albion Cross, Dundas, on the 3rd inst., Mrs. Malcolm Matheson in the 74th year of her age, leaving a husband, six sons—four in the Yukon, one in New York and one at home—and four daughters, one Mrs. D. McLean, St. Peters and three at home, with a large number of friends and acquaintances to mourn their loss. Deceased was an invalid for over 20 years. Her patience during her long period of suffering, her calm and amiable disposition and her firm trust in the Saviour made her life so beautiful that she was much loved by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance.

The angel of death has again visited the community of Feters Road, who now mourn the demise of an estimable and highly respected young woman. On April 20th, Effie Ann, the beloved wife of John Angus McSwain, departed this life after a brief illness of two days which baffled the best medical skill. Though but a few months residing in this locality the deceased had endeared herself to her new neighbors by her amiable manner and cheerful disposition. Always seeking pleasure in the comfort of others her last words were uttered to fortify and console the mourning friends. The bereaved husband whose life was bound up in her happiness, for he esteemed her his good angel who inspired him with hope and ambition, is prostrated in the intensity of his sorrow. The deceased who was but 25 years of age was the daughter of the late Alexander and Georgina McLean of "Hopedale". Besides the disconsolate husband, three sisters and one brother are left to mourn, but they are cheered by the hope that one so loving and self-denying in life was not forsaken in death. Rev. Mr. Sinclair who had united them in marriage eight months ago conducted the funeral services in a solemn and impressive manner. To the grief stricken husband, brother, and sisters The Guardian extends its sincere sympathy. The remains were conveyed to Little Sands Cemetery followed by a large concourse of friends.

R. H. Craswell of Woodstock P. E. I., died on the 29th of April in the 74th year of his age. He was the youngest son of the late Charles Craswell. A wife, two brothers and four sisters survive him. She departed this life on April 16th, after a short but severe illness at the early age of 27 years.
