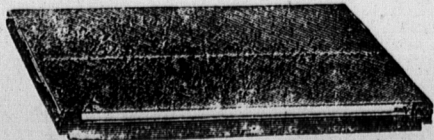

RESPECT FOR LAW.

In a noble address delivered before the International Law Association at its meeting in Portland Maine, the other day, Ambassador Bryce let fall his thought with regard to law and its obligations upon the citizen: "It comes not from above but from all around." That sentence connects us all as individuals, puts us in living touch with the great body of the law, which it is at once our duty and for our best interests to respect and obey. Our laws are not the decrees of despots, or the ordinances enacted by an oligarchy set above the people. In this country, as in all free countries, the people make their own laws, through their elected representatives.

The strength of the United Kingdom and of the Anglo Saxon race is due to the wise laws framed for the good of all, and the respect for those laws by the people themselves. These laws come not from thrones or potentates, and were not imposed by powers greater than our own. "Not from above but from all around," from the plain people, from us and from our neighbors. The laws are of the people, by the people and for the people. At their will good laws are enacted, or unwholesome laws repealed. There is in this the strongest reason why every citizen should respect and uphold the law of the land, why our children should be taught to honor the law, and why all should shrink from any action, no matter how harmless it may seem, once we know that it is "against the law."

The sacred right to make our own laws carries with it the responsibility to select men of ability and integrity as law makers and the responsibility on their part to give their best mind and best effort to shape the laws wisely. Upon all it imposes the duty of respect and obedience to laws which are the crystallized judgment of the community thus embodied in measures for the public welfare. There is no better test as to the moral standing and essential soundness of a community than is found in its respect for the law of the land and wherever that respect is held by the large majority of the public we have also the best assurance that a wholesome fear of the law will exist among those of lawless tendencies.

We speak of these things in this sober fashion because the tendency of the times is, we fear toward laxity of observance on the part of too many and laxity of vigilance and care on the part of those who are charged with the administration of the law. Good citizens all have a duty in these matters, especially in lending their countenance and support to all who are honestly engaged in commanding respect for law, from the policeman on our streets up to the Chief Justice of our highest court. The law of the land is the safeguard of our homes, our property, our liberty and our lives; it is one of our great possessions, and while "it came from all around" it has also the sanction of a Higher Power.

The accounts of Leader Borden's meetings as he proceeds westward tell of very large gatherings at every place where he speaks. Mr. Borden also appears to have a growing confidence in himself and his cause and at a recent meeting in Quebec

Province predicted that his party will have from 131 to 140 members in the Commons after the election. This is going it pretty strong for so moderate a man as Mr. Borden. Most Liberals will conclude that he is over sanguine. None the less the people have been apparently eager to hear what he has to say and have given him a very cordial reception.

Walter Wellman, after spending two years telling the world how he would reach the pole and in getting ready for the trip is now reported to have abandoned the attempt.

The great Edison in his young days was a telegraph operator at Stratford, On and was absent minded enough to send a train east in the teeth of another coming westward. Fortunately a collision was averted but Edison lost his job. He was summoned to meet the District Superintendent in Toronto and went thither for the purpose, but lost his nerve while waiting his turn in the ante-room. It was, fortunate all round that he lost his job for the unfit railway operator developed into a genius, the greatest inventor of the age and a millionaire.
