PASSING OF MR. THOMAS MITCHELL—There passed away on Friday night at the advanced age of 83 years, Mr. Thomas Mitchell Summerside. Mr. Mitchell was native of North Wiltshire but resided in Summerside for over 25 years. He lived at the west end of the town from the west end. Although he did not take an active part in any of the business or social affairs of the town, he was much highly esteemed and will be much missed by a wide circle of friends. The deceased was twice married, his first wife predeceasing him about 25 years ago. His second wife survives also one son, Thomas, student at Dalhousie University who is home on his vacation. One daughter, Miss Eliza Mitchell Summerside, is also left to mourn, and to whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy. The funeral took place on Sunday at 2 p.m. from his late residence and thence to North Wiltshire where interment was in the family plot, the remains being laid beside those of his first wife.—S

SUMMERSIDE, Aug 6—Many friends will regret to learn of the death of Dr. Edward Gabriel, of Kensington who was found dead in his bed about nine o'clock Sunday morning. Dr. Gabriel had not been well and had suffered with heart trouble. His wife was alone when she went to call and found that he had passed away. Dr. Jardine and Dr. McEwen were notified and after viewing the body called the coroner. A medical inquest was unnecessary.

Gillis was born in Indian River 87 years ago and was the son of the late Venantius Gillis and Katherine MacLellan. He attended the public school until he was fifteen years of age when he went to St. Dunstan's University for four years and afterwards to McGill University, taking his degree of medical doctor in 1899. He practiced his profession in Kensington where he practiced until his death. He was of a kindly nature and was highly esteemed in the community. He was a member of the Roman Catholic Church at Indian River also a member of the Holy Name Society at Indian River. In 1906 he married Miss Anna Maria Frazer of Kensington. There were no children of the marriage but he had living with him two adopted daughters, Miss Margaret and Miss Gertrude Gillis. There are left to mourn besides the widow four brothers, His Excellency Most Reverend Joseph P. Gillis of Burlington, Vermont, Alfred, Joseph, and Hubert at Indian River, also four sisters, namely, Sr. Mary Loretta of St.

Michael's Convent, Burlington, Vermont; Martina, Mrs. John McMillan of Edmonton; Cicely, Mrs. John A. McLellan, Indian River; and Mary, Mrs. Joseph M. Gillis, Indian River, to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy in their sudden bereavement.

There passed peacefully away on June 3, 1933, David Ferguson, Marshfield, aged sixty-four years. Funeral took place on June 6th. He was a man of kind disposition, a loving father and brother. His wife predeceased him 20 years ago. THE COMMUNITY OF Bedeque and citizens of Summerside were shocked to learn on Monday morning of the sudden passing of Dr. Albert D. Sharp at the comparatively early age of 47 years. Dr. Sharp passed away at 4.45 a. m. Monday, less than 24 hours after Dr. Gillis, of Kensington had passed away. Dr. Sharp had a heart attack about two weeks ago, but had recovered and was feeling quite well on Sunday. He was born in Summerside, the son of the late John A. Sharp and Mrs. Sharp. He was educated at the Summerside High School and later at Acadia University, where he took his Medical Degree. At the outbreak of the Great War he went with the McGill Medical Unit to the front. Later he joined the Imperial Royal Army Medical Corps, and served with that unit until the close of the war. He was mentioned in dispatches several times and on April 9, 1917, received the Military Cross "for gallant and distinguished bravery in the field," having been mentioned in a dispatch by Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig for this special honour. After the war he returned to Montreal and took a special Medical Course at the Montreal General Hospital. Later he took up a practice at Wellington and about twelve years ago started up in Bedeque, where he has enjoyed the confidence of a large clientele. Dr. Sharp was a man with a pleasing personality, and was held in high regard by his fellow doctors and parishioners. He was a member of the United Church at Bedeque and also a member of Hiram and Lebanon Masonic Lodge, Summerside. He leaves to mourn his widow, who before her marriage was Miss George McQuarrie, daughter of the late Judge McQuarrie, of Summerside, three children, Miss Betty and Masters John and Neil, at home; also his mother, Mrs. John A. Sharp, and his sister, Miss Zilpha, both at Summerside; two sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) Frank McNeill, of Winnipeg, who returned home just a few days ago; Mrs. James A. McKinnon, of Edmonton, who is visiting her mother at present; and two brothers, Dr. Claude Sharp, of Edmonton; and Dr. Richard Sharp, of Providence, R.I., who arrived home a few days ago, and to all of whom The Guardian extends sympathy. One brother George was killed in action near the end of the Great War and another brother, Ludwig, died following an accident about two years ago.
